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Simply ingenious

When I ordered this PC card on eBay (US) (no RAM, no software) I was very sceptical if it would work. The 64 RAM chips (41256-15) I could buy at least on eBay (DE) for a little money.

But nevertheless the excitement was very big. After all RAM components had been checked individually and plugged in and the software had been installed, the big moment came. Now just run the setup program, enter the hardware components correctly, restart the computer and run the program UP.EXE ...

PC-elevATor (Applied Reasoning) 2 MB RAM, 80286-10 (Rev. 2.0)

This card is already a newer model (Rev 2.0), because an 80286-10 is installed. The first models have an 80286-8 processor.

It's hard to believe, but the first model with 2 MB and 8 MHz cost \$2.495 in 1985! See PC-Mag 11/1985.

It gets even better. In 1986 the 10 MHz version with 2 MB cost \$2.745, plus \$425 for the 8 MHz 80287 coprocessor. See PC-Mag 09/1986.

Whether the PC-elevATor also supports the protected mode I cannot say/test, because the hardware and software I use is too old to install Windows/286.

According to my current information the PC-elevATor was mainly designed for the speed increase from 8088/4.77 to 80286/10 in real mode.

Quote PC-Mag 11/1985: "According to Applied Reasoning, the PC-elevATor supports the 80286 extended memory and will run $VDISK\ there."$

In addition, it is possible to set up expanded memory (EMM) in the setup program. Unfortunately I can't say more about this topic.
