- 1. Save and close all open files and exit all open programs.
- 2. Shut down the operating system:

Click Start -> Shut Down -> Shut down

Windows Vista®:

Click the Start button 🚳 , click the arrow 🌇 , and then click Shut Down.

Windows 7:

Click the Start button 🚳 and then click Shut Down.

3. Ensure that the computer is turned off. If your computer did not automatically turn off when you shut down your operating system, press and hold the power button until the computer turns off.

Boot Sequence

Boot Options

1 Hard Drive — The computer attempts to boot from the primary hard drive. If no operating system is on the drive, the computer generates an error message.

1 USB Flash Device — Insert the memory device into a USB port and restart the computer. When F12 Boot Options appears in the lower-right corner of the screen, press <F12>. The BIOS detects the device and adds the USB flash option to the boot menu.

MOTE: To boot to a USB device, the device must be bootable. To ensure that your device is bootable, check the device documentation.

1 CD/DVD Drive — The computer attempts to boot from the CD/DVD drive. If no CD/DVD is in the drive, or if the CD/DVD has no operating system, the computer generates an error message.

Changing Boot Sequence for the Current Boot

You can use this feature to change the current boot sequence, for example, to boot from the CD/DVD drive to run the Dell Diagnostics on the Drivers and Utilities media. On completion of diagnostic tests, the previous boot sequence is restored.

- 1. If you are booting to a USB device, connect the USB device to a USB connector.
- 2. Turn on (or restart) your computer.
- 3. When F2 = Setup, F12 Boot Options appears in the lower-right corner of the screen, press <F12>.

If you wait too long and the operating system logo appears, continue to wait until you see the Microsoft Windows desktop. Then shut down your computer and try again.

The Boot Device Menu appears, listing all available boot devices.

4. On the Boot Device Menu choose the device you want to boot from.

For example, if you are booting to a USB memory key, highlight USB Flash Device and press < Enter >.

MOTE: To boot to a USB device, the device must be bootable. To ensure your device is bootable, check the device documentation.

Changing Boot Sequence for Future Boots

- 1. Enter system setup utility (see Entering System Setup Utility).
- 2. Use the arrow keys to highlight the Boot menu option and press <Enter> to access the menu.

NOTE: Write down your current boot sequence in case you want to restore it.

- 3. Press the up- and down-arrow keys to move through the list of devices.
- 4. Press plus (+) or minus (-) to change the boot priority of the device.
