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Industry

Boy ... what a way to end the year! The Pentium thing caught us all by surprise, and some important lessons have been learned by Intel, the industry, and yes, our customers too. Intel learned what it feels like to write off over \$400 million; we in the industry learned what it feels like when our high-profile CPU supplier has a hiccup; and our customers learned that PCs are not perfect. All in all, some tough lessons, and the customer lesson may be the toughest of all.

It's funny, because at Gateway 2000 we had a lot to look forward to last year. Most forecasts indicated that the '94 holiday season would be a PC bonanza. And it was. Clothing and other typical holiday purchases actually declined while the PC industry chalked up a record quarter. The Allman Brothers played at Gateway's annual party, and they even bought a few computers before they left. Of course, we were worried about Compaq's record inventories and how long it would take them to sell \$2.3 billion worth of inventory. Compaq may need to start date-coding their computers, same as milk and eggs.

Well, what do we have to look forward to this year? Windows 95? Cross your fingers and start planning now. Windows 95 will change the way we work and compute, but there will be a learning curve and maybe some additional RAM for those of you with only 4MB. This is also Gateway 2000's 10th anniversary year, and we have plenty in store. Lots of cool things on the marketing roadmap, new features such as 3-D graphics and surround sound. And wouldn't it be cool if there was a CD changer that could shuttle multiple CDs just like your car stereo? Maybe a special computer for you Gateway connoisseurs. Then there's the information highway. We think this is the year. With all the talk about convergence and the InfoBahn, there's been little talk about computers that will make it all possible. A computer that's easy to use, includes great multimedia, integrates your other home electronics, great for the entire family, and the Destination of our national information highway structure. It should also have a great price.

Rock on.

How Do I Get There?

For many people who are interested in exploring the online world right now, the most pressing issue is the choice of the online service. Without understanding the real differences between these choices, it's hard to know for sure if you've made the right choice.

Fortunately, in a sense, there is almost no wrong choice, only better ones. That's because the big three commercial services, America Online, CompuServe and Prodigy, are well developed enough at this point that most people can easily grasp and begin using some things that make the online world so popular. But as each of the services can successfully boast about one thing or another that is unique to them, one of them could very well be a better fit for you than the others.

One way of differentiating between the services is by thinking of them as television broadcast channels. In the same way that ABC, CNN, ESPN, FX, MTV and the Weather Channel distinguish themselves with the content they provide, and subsequently by the types of people who regularly tune in, so do the different commercial online services. They all have their own style, their own flavor and character.

An important difference between online networks and broadcast networks is that you, the user, get to meet and interact with other users in a way that broadcasters can only dream about today. Full interactivity.

Another difference is the various interfaces used by each of the online networks, or what their software looks like to the user. All broadcast channels have the same interface, whether or not you use a remote control. You only have to know how to switch between the channels and know when the desired program is being broadcast. Imagine if there were a different set of commands to make your TV tune in ESPN. Or CNN. Or HBO.

Yet another difference is billing. If the online services model prevailed with broadcast and cable TV today, you would be receiving a separate bill each month from ABC, NBC, CBS, CNN, ESPN, etc.

The Internet

What about the Internet, the mother of all online networks? What's it like? "That's like asking what the phone system is like," said Vince, one of our local online gurus. Ask a stupid question, get a stupid answer? Not quite. Vince rather succinctly addresses the

nature of the Internet. Things like your location do not matter anymore (a great thing no matter if you're calling from New York City, Hong Kong or South Dakota).

In the same way that it doesn't matter whether you call someone from a pay phone, your office phone or a cellular phone on a boat, the kind of computer you use also does not matter on the Internet. If you can forget about performance (for just this moment), an old Gateway 16MHz 386SX with a 2400 baud modem connects just as easily as a \$25,000 Silicon Graphics multiprocessor workstation with an \$8,000/year T1 connection.

From the user's standpoint, the Internet is quite a bit like the phone system. You can go wherever you want as long as you know the number, or the IP (Internet Protocol) address in this case. You can potentially reach out and touch any one of about 30 million users worldwide. In fact, there are coffee makers,

vending machines, and best of all, Paul's hot tub, on the Net with their own IP addresses. And since most of the commercial online services are beginning to provide more and more access to the Internet, getting out there will not be a big issue in the future.

Now What?

OK, so this new world is really big. Almost anyone can use it. And, it's going to change our lives. But, these online networks are not going to be able to do this by themselves, no matter how interconnected.

While PC technology continues to evolve along some very predictable paths (bigger, faster, cheaper), two more new and important technological developments will also be taking place. One will take place over the next two years and will give your PC brand new abilities. The other is beginning to happen today and will supercharge your connection to the online world.

The one that will happen inside your PC is Voice+Data, or fax/ modems capable of handling your blabbing while connected to

another computer. This will give you the ability to call someone and talk to them, with your voice, and use programs on each other's computers. Both at the same time.

And, guess what? This will be cheaper and more flexible than almost any other form of communication, next to yelling out the front door at your neighbor. If you are doing this via a worldwide network (the Internet, CompuServe — whatever), it will no longer matter where you call but only how long you stay connected.

For most of us though, trying to do this over our current phone lines is kind of like what would happen if you tried to run a watermelon through your garbage disposal. It might actually work but it's going to take a long time.


So, doing this and the other cool things that people haven't discovered yet in the new world are going to require better connections than 28,800 baud (the best that's currently available). Way

better. Fortunately, help is on the way in the form of fatter pipelines. This is the second of those two technological developments, the one that is beginning to happen today, slowly. For some people, this will be fiber. Others will get ISDN. Both will do their bit to make it all real.

Uniquely Positioned

We are currently putting the finishing touches on a software product that should help tie a lot of this together. Known internally as the Information Highway CD, this product will provide some practical guidance for those customers who are perplexed about how and where to begin their first adventures in the online world, as well as those who have already ventured out and now want more.

This excites us out here in North Sioux City, South Dakota, (and in Kansas City, Sioux Falls, Dublin and Singapore, too) because it is going to allow us to improve our ability to work directly with you, our customer. The more powerful your PC becomes as a communication device, the more valuable your direct relationship with Gateway 2000. And having a friend in the business is going to take on a whole new meaning.

Drivers. This is a common topic of discussion these days.

What's a driver? It's a software program that allows your computer to communicate with your sound card, CD-ROM, video card or numerous other peripherals. The Gateway BBS has all the current drivers for your computer, and they're easy to obtain. Having the latest drivers will assure you compatibility with other software and hardware and help you achieve trouble-free computing. Go ahead and take a look on the Gateway BBS and download to your heart's

desire. It's free, fast and good practice using your modem.

- Q. I downloaded a driver file from your BBS. Now what do I do with it?
- A. Make a test directory on your hard drive and copy the downloaded file to the directory. Next, you need to expand the file. If the file that you downloaded has an .exe extension, just type the file name and hit Enter. The file will decompress and become many files, one of them usually being a Readme.txt file containing setup information. If the file has a .zip extension, then you'll have to use PKUnzip to decompress the file.

PKZip is a utility widely available and used solely for the purpose of compressing and

decompressing a group of files for easy transfer from a BBS. This utility is available on the Gateway BBS and most other BBS's for that matter. The name of the file is PKZ204.EXE, and it is a selfextracting file. Expand the file, and you will see PKUNZIP.EXE appear. All you have to do to use this file is type PKUNZIP and the name of the .zip file and hit Enter. The file will decompress in the same manner as an .exe file. Then install the drivers as you would any other drivers. If you're unsure how this is done, there is usually a file called Readme.txt or some variation thereof that will explain the proper procedure.

A good way to retrieve messages from the Gateway BBS or any other BBS is to use an off-line mail reader. Instead of racking up a large phone bill reading messages on-line, there are programs available that will automatically log onto your favorite BBS, retrieve the messages you want, and hang up, all in just a few minutes. This

way you can take your time reading and responding to messages, and not accrue excessive on-line time. You may also compose new messages in the same manner. There are a number of shareware programs available, and they can be found on most BBS's, including ours. To find them, log on, and at the main menu, type L (for File Libraries), 8 (for Misc. Files and Patches), 3 (for Off-line Mail Readers) and hit Enter. This will take you to the files where you can then decide which one you want. Remember, these are only

> available at 605-232-2224 and not through the 800 number.

Well, now that you're wired up to your favorite online service, you're going to be posting and reading messages like there's no tomorrow. Posting a message is pretty easy. Below are a few suggestions to help you get your point across the first time and in a courteous fashion.

- 1) When you post a note requesting technical support, leave as much detail as possible. Leave your system configuration and specific details concerning the situation. This will ensure that you receive an appropriate answer the first time.
- 2) If you're responding to someone else's note, you might want to use "message quoting." In other words, copying the original note, pulling out the relevant parts and incorporating them into your response makes it easier for readers to understand your message. Off-line mail readers copy the original note automatically, so all you have to do is delete the parts of the note you don't want. Also, it's a good idea to insert >> symbols in front of the original poster's lines to differentiate between your and his/her note.
- 3) When posting a message, don't use all capital letters. THIS IS CONSIDERED SHOUTING and is also difficult to read. Of course, if you feel like shouting, feel free. We all have to shout sometime.
- 4) Most importantly, enjoy yourself and get the most you can out of your on-line experience.

Curiously for such a critical component, the CD-ROM has long been one of the slowest components in the PC. The original "single speed" readers transferred data at about 150KB per second. This was fine for accessing simple data files and installing software, but when the MPC2 (Multimedia PC level 2) standard emerged, software publishers started writing games and other applications requiring large amounts of data to "stream" off the CD-ROM. Thus, the bare minimum standard today is a "double-speed" CD-ROM capable of doing 300KB or better. Of course, the industry moves so that newer and faster hardware is common and new applications quickly consume all your available space and speed. 
Laser printers are a step up from ink jet printers. Buy a laser printer if you need excellent quality printouts and require a fast printing speed for large volumes of material. Laser printers should be your choice for your business; or for printing on several sizes of paper, including transparen-

cies, envelopes and labels, at a faster speed with sharper type and crisper graphics. If you plan to use a printer with a network of computers now or in the future, laser is the way to go. Today's laser printers are becoming very affordable, making it possible for you to also have laser performance in your home.

Not sure how to set a printer up for Windows? Open Control Panel in the Main group and double click on the Printers icon. Next, click on Add, and choose a printer from the list provided by highlighting it and clicking on Install. A dialog box prompts you for a diskette or CD containing the driver for your printer. Give it the correct path to the driver. If you have a Gateway system CD then it would be in the WFW3.11 directory. After you give it the path, click on OK and your driver will install. Click on the "Set as Default Printer" button. Next, click on Connect and choose the proper port for your printer — it will most likely be LPT1. Finally, close the Printers box and you're ready to print.



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RAM. Random Access Memory — this refers to computer memory used to temporarily hold programs and data. It may not sound like much, but what it does for you is speed up your PC. The more RAM you have, the more programs you can run at the same time and the more data that can be processed instantly. It means less waiting while your computer "thinks." When it comes to RAM, more is better.

Want to upgrade your memory but not sure how? If you can use a Phillips screwdriver, you can add RAM. First, unplug the machine, making sure you're grounded. With the screwdriver, remove the screws holding the case and cover together. Locate the existing SIMMs (memory modules). There will be some empty slots next to them where you'll add the new memory. On most motherboards, you have to tilt the SIMM at a 45-degree angle; slide the module into the slot and tilt up until it snaps into place. Remember: when adding memory, do so in pairs (banks) on the Intel

motherboards and singly on most others. Your manual should have the specifications. You might have to move a switch or two if your computer is a few years old, otherwise the machine will automatically recognize the new memory.

Keep in mind, if you have parity SIMMS, buy parity SIMMS (same with non-parity). You can mix the two, but just make sure you don't put one of each in the same bank, or you could experience problems.



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Can Never Get Enough of

DRAM by Rob Cheng, Gateway 2000 Director, Desktop Products

You heard it here first! A subtle flaw has been detected in commonly marketed memory modules placed in most computers. This flaw, initially detected by a whale scientist in Antarctica, affects graphical instructions associated with certain obese operations executed in subzero temperatures. Just kidding, but I think that the entire Pentium incident was a planned publicity stunt by the incredible Intel marketing organization. Truly brilliant.

But seriously, DRAM (Dynamic Random Access Memory, or just Memory) is one of the most important decisions made during the purchase of a PC. Aside from the CPU itself, the amount of DRAM in a PC defines the performance of the PC more than any other subsystem. Why? DRAM is similar to the short-term memory in your brain. All kinds of miscellaneous information is stored in short-term memory for easy access. Problems occur when you run out of short-term memory; you get stressed, yell at your spouse and kick the dog. Since your computer can't do these things, it starts storing information in long-term memory, better known as your hard drive. This is great, except it's dog slow. And it's your computer's way of stressing out, and not running optimally.

To make matters worse, software developers are creating fantastic and feature-rich applications, but each successive application requires more DRAM.

And then, we have Windows 95. One flaw in DOS is that the memory manager is rather inefficient. And the Windows 95 memory manager has been entirely rewritten to maximize memory performance. Furthermore, some of our internal tests indicate that an additional 8MB of DRAM will give a more superior performance than moving to the next processor level. This is great news for people trying to scrape a little more performance out of their computers. A Windows 95 and memory upgrade might get some older PCs running almost like a new one.

All the dynamics indicate that industry demand for DRAM should be growing. And it is. The amount of DRAM per system has grown 20% over the last six months. In fact, some customers invest more money in DRAM than in a CPU! We also anticipate that '95 DRAM demand will continue to grow. The rub is that DRAM is priced and purchased as a commodity. All the best and worst of our capitalist society are reflected in DRAM availability and pricing.

The overriding factors in DRAM availability and costs are basic market fundamentals — supply and demand. Simply put, DRAM demand is on the rise, and the problem of supply is improving, albeit slowly. Worldwide DRAM supply is dictated by humongous investments in large high-tech plants that take years to build. In fact, DRAM manufacturing is more complex than the technologies used

to manufacture a CPU.


Where does all the money for these fabulously large and ultra high-tech manufacturing sites come from? The answer: very fat gross margins. The DRAM guys know that demand is growing quickly, and the only prayer of matching supply and demand in the long run is to fund tremendous capital expenditures with fat margins today. The more money the DRAM industry makes today, the better possibility for lower DRAM (and therefore PC) prices in two to three years.

Unfortunately, this creates strong upward pressure on DRAM prices. Fortunately, it's not a monopoly situation, so competitive forces keep

prices flat, yet high. Remember the explosion in the Japanese resin factory? The Kobe earthquake? Every opportunity be it perceived or real puts a subtle upward pressure on pricing. People panic and start hoarding DRAM creating artificial holes in supply. Don't want to point fingers at anyone, but we all have to act responsibly to continue to give customers the best value today.

So, demand is up, and supply is flat, and barriers to entry are rather high. Not good for an industry with a track record of reducing costs and improving value quarterly. Fortunately, there are a few developments that will abate this trend. New memory technologies are being developed that will increase the amount of memory that one chip can hold. The general hope in the industry is that this new technology will allow supply and demand to eventually meet. Hold on to your hats, because it should be an interesting year.

DRAM is becoming a more and more important performance factor of your PC. Today's software applications demand more, and Windows 95 will beg for it. Our advice is to buy as much as you can during the purchase of your PC. The sooner we increase demand today, the quicker we can realize lower prices in the future.

Microsoft Corp.'s very ambitious push into the consumer market is being lead by a bespectacled, yellow smiley face named "Bob." Announced at the January Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas, and due out March 31, 1995, Bob is Microsoft's attempt to simplify using a PC by offering users familiar images of rooms and non-threatening cartoon-like characters which replace traditional menu-driven interfaces.

Apple Computer Inc., which earned early praise for the

simplicity of its Macintosh line of computers, will try to make its computers even easier to use with its forthcoming Copland operating system. But not everyone uses a Mac. In fact, IDC, a leading computer market researcher, reports that Apple's marketshare dropped from 9.4% in 1993 to 8.5% in 1994. Even so, critics have said PCs have to be much simpler in order to be embraced by the masses. Microsoft Chairman and

CEO Bill Gates thinks his

company is on the right track with Bob and promises that the Redmond, Washington, software giant will add more interactive capabilities to its other products.

Originally code-named "Data Wizard" and later "Utopia," Bob is based on the research of Clifford Nass and Byron Reeves, two Stanford University experts in the field of communications between humans and machines. Bob, which has already been tested with more than 1,200 users, is being referred to as a "social interface." With Bob, users choose from 14 intelligent agents, which include a dog named Rover, a rat named Scuzz, a rabbit named Hopper, and an elephant named Hank, who learn an individual user's preferences and level of expertise, and offer the appropriate help.

In addition, Bob offers users a "Home" environment that streamlines navigation. Users can custom decorate their home environments and even change the scenery outside. Bob allows users to assign special symbols for their existing DOS and Windows programs, so they can launch them from any room.

Bob also offers eight applications that are tightly linked to automate common household tasks. The programs included are Letter Writer for composing quick notes and correspondence; Checkbook for electronic management and payment of bills; Calendar and To-Do List for organizing dates and tasks; Household Manager, for managing household projects and inventories; Address Book for organizing addresses; E-Mail links to other Bob households or standard e-mail and Internet

> service providers; Financial Guide to organize financial information such as account contacts and safe-deposit-box contents; and GeoSafari, an educational geographical quiz game. Users can separately purchase MS Great Greetings for creating cards and invitations.

To begin a task with Bob, users interact with a selected cartoon guide in a conversational manner rather than going through menus and complex

> commands. These guides provide program choices for specific

tasks, intelligent help and information. For example, to find out how much money is in a checking account, users simply type into a cartoon balloon, "what's my checkbook balance?" The animated guide responds by starting the Checkbook applications and then gives the balance. If an overdraft was discovered and a call to the bank required, the guide instructs users on how to "hot-key" to the To-Do List or Calendar application to enter a reminder to call the bank.

But all this ease of use comes with a hefty memory requirement. Bob requires 8MB of RAM and takes up 30MB of hard disk space. Fortunately, the majority of multimedia systems come standard with 8MB RAM, although some PCs are still out there with only 4MB. Bob also requires Windows 3.1 or higher; a 486 processor; a super VGA, 256-color monitor; and a mouse or compatible pointing device. To take advantage of Bob's E-Mail and Checkbook's on-line features, users will need a modem.

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Murphy's Law

Anything that can go wrong, will.

Good old Murphy. I don't know who he or she was, but the law is as durable as any that Moses brought down from the mountain. If you're like me, Murphy touches your life many times — almost every day, probably. The guy in line in front of you at McDonald's orders 20 Big Macs with no "special sauce." You need to be at an important appointment and your always-dependable, speedy route is suddenly clogged with traffic. The list goes on.

Last December, Murphy reared his/her ugly head in a big way.
Here are roughly 2.87967 factors that headed for an ironic collision:

Factor 1: The fourth quarter is always the busiest time of year for Gateway and everyone else in the PC industry.

Factor 2: PC purchases were at an all-time high. In 1994, International Data Corporation estimated that 18.4 million units were purchased, an increase of 23% over last year!

Factor 2.87967: Intel's Pentium processor staked out its position as the most powerful, affordable mainstream CPU — able to efficiently run all the latest demanding business and multimedia applications. If you watched *any* TV, you couldn't miss an Intel commercial, unless you were watching C-Span.

So, what could possibly disrupt this pretty picture? A bug in the Pentium chip, you say? Come on. Bugs are a part of the business. Just look at the past as per a recent story in the *Wall Street Journal*.

— The Apple III had so many bugs when it was introduced in 1980 it had to be redesigned. The company discontinued the model in 1984.

— In 1987, the new Intel 386 chip had a math flaw; Intel fixed it but resulting chip shortages forced the company to take a charge against earnings. A math flaw in Intel's 486 chip meant Compaq Computer Corp. was forced to delay some product introductions. Intel corrected the flaw before many chips were shipped to PC makers.

— Motorola's floating-point unit of some versions of its PowerPC 601 chips ran slower than specifications required. Apple began using the slower chips this year to upgrade older Macs, informing consumers that the chips were slower.

So why would a very minor flaw in the FPU (floating point unit) of the Pentium chip cause such a brouhaha? Intel maintains that users with the flawed chip will only experience imperfect results once every 27,000 years when conducting extensive divide calcula-

tions, and that anyone who does not perform such calculations has nothing to worry about. In fact, Gateway had not received a single complaint about the flaw until the attention devoted by the media to the FPU eventually took its toll.

Refreshment Course in PR 101

You see, Intel had become accustomed to its role as the numberone chip supplier and keeping up with the pressure of being first to market with the hottest technology, so they overlooked a major fact. Intel is now a *consumer* company. Guess what? That Intel Inside campaign actually worked! That's right. Consumers now recognize the name Intel almost as easily as Coke, Tide, Sony and Chevrolet. So Intel could run, but they could not hide from consumers.

Intel eventually offered to send a replacement chip to any customer who wanted one. This was the *right* thing to do. Give Intel an "A+" on their final exam in public relations. But give them a "C" on their mid-term, since it took a few tries to get it right.

Strike 1: Intel knew about the problem and still shipped a flawed chip, however minute the flaw. This did not sit well with customers.

Strike 2: Intel failed to realize its presence in the consumer market and thus, how the average consumer would react to Intel's policy of "we'll determine whether or not you need a new chip."

Swing and a Hit: Intel announced a no-questions-asked replacement policy. Now *this* was what our customers want to hear — that the company they bought from will fix its mistakes.

Home Run: Intel strengthened the Pentium's image by backing it up with a *lifetime guarantee*. Will we see that from IBM and the PowerPC?

Intel learned a valuable lesson and became somewhat of a martyr for the rest of the computer industry. Microsoft was taking notes while Intel's Andy Grove was called to the front of class. Not about to make the same mistake, Bill Gates and company delayed the release of Windows 95 until it was right. They turned their work in late, but they will get an "A" for extra credit.

A precedent has been set in the industry. And we're all winners as a result. Intel learned that customers want the latest technology quickly, but more importantly they want it to work the first time out.

The future no doubt holds another series of events that will happen because they can. But even Murphy would have to admit we can all look forward to more dependable PC products from now on.

Tech Tips



by Phil Ellis Gateway 2000 Technical Writer, Customer Support more than one sound card in the system, you should answer NO to this. If you didn't do this, run the SSINIT program, and under the hardware settings place a check mark in the SB

Emulation box and the Enable Joystick box.

When your machine is booting, you'll see the message: "Starting MS-DOS..." If you hit the F5 key, your system will bypass your config.sys and autoexec.bat and go directly to a C:\ prompt. You might have heard the term "booting clean" to describe this step. To see what your Startup files actually do, hit the F8 key. Each line will appear, and you're asked to hit Y to load or N to not load each line individually. This is a good tool for troubleshooting, as you can see where any error messages occur, or if you simply want to see what each command in the Startup files does.

Q. I just bought a new Gateway computer, and it came with a Vivitron monitor. I seem to have a line running horizontally through the whole screen. Is this a problem?

A. The line that you see is a "damper wire" and is on all Sony Trinitron picture tubes. This wire is used to dampen vibrations of the aperture grille. This grille is a feature of Trinitron technology, which allows more light to pass through the screen, giving the Trinitron monitor more color and brightness than other monitors. It will appear more with a white background, however, so you might want to change the background color to a light blue if the line seems to be prevalent in your display.

A fast solution to a lot of "Not Enough Memory" errors is to run the Memmaker / Batch command. If your DOS-based game requires expanded memory, however, you can't use this tip. Then follow these steps:

- 1. Type Memmaker /Batch and Enter.
- 2. When you get a display on the screen, hit Enter twice. You should then be at the C:\prompt.
- 3. Reboot the system.

Q. Is there anything I should be doing to maintain my system's hard drive?

A. If you have DOS 6.2 or higher, it's a good idea to periodically run Scandisk and Defrag on the hard drive. They will optimize the drive, report any problems, and attempt to correct them. If you're adding or deleting programs, this leaves spaces on the hard disk where there's no longer data. Defrag will get rid of these spaces, leaving more room on the hard drive and making your programs run a bit faster. Scandisk fixes any defects or bad spots on the drive. To run Scandisk, at the C:\ prompt type Scandisk and hit Enter. When you run Defrag, try the following command: DEFRAG C: /F/B. The /F will defrag the full drive and the /B will reboot the machine when Defrag is done.

Making sure you have a recent backup of your hard drive is one of the most important and least considered tasks of owning a computer. No matter what size or kind of computer you have, they're all subject to the same little monsters that cause your hard drive to crash, and at the most inconvenient times! There's a very simple and relatively inexpensive way to make sure you're prepared for this unlikely but possible event. Get a tape backup unit (TBU). And it just so happens that we sell them (see page12). If you can run a Phillips screwdriver then you can install a TBU, and this could save you future headaches.

Getting an error on your Gateway 2000 Pentium processor-based system once every 27,000 years or so? The newly updated Pentium chip is available, and if you would like it, the quickest way to obtain it is by calling Intel at 800-628-8686. You can also get the updated chip by calling Gateway Technical Support. Just by flipping a lever on the processor ZIF socket, out with the old and in with the new, down with the lever, and you're off and running, flaw free.

When you want to save the position of your desktop, you don't have to click on the "Save Settings On Exit" option. Just hold the shift key down and double click on the file drawer (-) at the top left of the Program Manager.

If you have programs in your Startup group but occasionally you don't want them to start, you may bypass this group by holding down the shift key while Windows is loading.

If you have an Ensoniq SoundScape card in your system and are having difficulties getting sound out of a DOS-based game such as DOOM or MadDog McCree, download the version 1.2 drivers from our BBS at 800-846-7562. These files are in the Sound Card Library, and the names are Endsk1.exe and Endsk2.exe. When you install these drivers, you are asked if you have a Sound Blaster or SB-compatible card installed. 





In another room of the house we found the CPU, and out in the backyard we found the keyboard. fact that I had lost so many files on my Gateway, so my wife suggested I dig it out and see if I could recover anything. I told her I was sure it wouldn't work. After all it had been in the attic of the room which took a direct hit from a mortar, and it had fallen eight feet when the ceilings collapsed. With the monitor's case being all but destroyed (there are big skid marks where it slid across the floor), I was positive it would never work. The first problem I had was that the cords had been lost so I had to use some old lamp cords and alligator clips to power it.






