# Quadboard Operation Manual

Quadboard Manual (384K version)

Before attempting to install Quadram's Quadboard, read this operations manual thoroughly. If for any reason you should require technical assistance or advice, contact your authorized Quadram dealer or local computer retailer.

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### **FOREWORD**

Quadram now gives IBM PC and XT users greater flexibility and more expansion possibilities with Quadboard. Regardless of whether the IBM Personal Computer is being used at home or at the office, Quadboard can solve a major problem many users have. Because Quadram has taken 9 of the most-needed IBM PC functions and combined them all onto one board requiring just one expansion slot. This leaves the IBM with the rest of its slots free for future expansion.

Quadboard contains a serial RS-232C communications port, a Centronics compatible parallel printer port, up to 384K of RAM, chronograph (real-time clock/calendar), game port, QuadRAM Drive (RAM Disk) software, MasterSpool (software print spooler), MasterCache (disk caching), and Qswap (a line printer swap program).


A DIP Switch and jumper pins provided on the Quadboard allow you to program the board for the specific needs of your system.

The parallel and serial ports are functionally identical to IBM's.

The chronograph (extremely accurate clock/calendar) uses a crystal controlled integrated circuit with a life time rechargeable battery.

And the game port is fully IBM-compatible. It can be used with game paddles or joysticks.

Included in the Quadboard package is the QuadMaster II disk: software designed to let you get the most out of the Quadboard in your system. Complete software instructions and descriptions are included in the "QuadMaster II Operations Manual."

### INTRODUCTION

Quadboard from Quadram Corporation is a multifunction board designed especially for the IBM Personal Computer and PCXT. Quadboard greatly increases the operational capabilities of the computer while using only one of the computer's expansion slots. The following hardware functions are implemented on the Quadboard.

- 1) Random Access Memory (RAM) expansion in 64K increments from 0 to 384K.
- 2) An EIA RS-232C serial interface for asynchronous communications,
- 3) A Centronics compatible parallel printer interface,
- 4) A battery-powered chronograph,
- 5) And, an IBM compatible game port.


Figure 1 is a block diagram of the Quadboard showing its major features and their approximate locations on the board.

Additionally, QuadMaster II software is included in the Quadboard package. Provided in this software are programs to use part of the Quadboard's memory as single or multiple RAM drives, set up a print buffer in Quadboard memory, and execute a line printer swap program to change LPT1 and LPT2 back and forth. There are also programs to set the date and time for the chronograph, as well as many other useful utilities.

The Quadboard is completely hardware and software compatible with the Personal Computer and is designed for performance and reliability. It has been constructed of high-quality components and engineered for minimum power consumption to keep the computer running cool. Each board has been "burned-in" and thoroughly tested to insure years of reliable service.

## **Extended Warranty**

In addition to the one-year warranty provision detailed elsewhere in this manual, Quadram offers a five-year extended warranty when the Quadboard (384 version) is purchased fully populated.



#### DESCRIPTION

This section provides a description of the Quadboard's hardware features. Operational details are given in the OPERATION section.

### Memory

The memory section is made up of six rows of nine sockets. None, one, two, three, four, five, or six rows will have ICs installed depending on whether the Quadboard is configured for 0K, 64K, 128K, 192K, 256K, 320K, or 384K bytes of memory, respectively. Each row is a 64K bank of memory that includes eight data bits and one parity bit. When a parity error is detected a latch is set and an I/O Check Line is activated to indicate an error to the processor.

## **Asynchronous Communications Interface**

The asynchronous communications interface (serial interface) is a standard EIA RS-232C interface that is fully programmable and supports IBM asynchronous communications. The baud rate is programmable from 50 to 9600 baud. An INS 8250 Asynchronous Communications Element (ACE) or equivalent IC controls all serial operations.

Communications protocol is a function of system code and must be loaded before the adapter is operational. System software is required to handle all interface and control signal status. This software is automatically provided when using DOS or advanced BASIC.

The serial interface is implemented as data terminal equipment (DTE) and uses a male 25 pin D-type connector. The connector is mounted at the rear of the board and has an IBM expansion slot panel mounted to it that replaces the installed blank panel.

#### **Parallel Printer Interface**

The parallel printer interface is designed to connect to printers with Centronics compatible interfaces. It is functionally identical to IBM's Parallel Printer Adapter and supports the graphics functions on many printers with graphics features. Driver software may be required to support the graphics functions in some printers. A short cable with a 16 pin DIP header at one end and a female 25 pin D-type connector at the other end is provided for interfacing a printer to the Quadboard. The female 25 pin D-type connector is mounted in the I/O connector bracket that comes in the Quadboard package (see INSTALLATION).

## Chronograph

The chronograph is a battery powered, crystal controlled date and time keeping circuit that is used to set the Personal Computer's own internal Clock/Calendar whenever DOS is booted from a disk. A NiCad battery provides power for the chronograph when the PC is turned off. The battery is recharged when the PC is turned on. An adjustment is provided for setting the accuracy of the chronograph. This is preset at the factory and normally will not require adjustment. Software for accurately setting the PC's internal clock/calendar when DOS is booted is provided on the accompanying QuadMaster disk. A program is also provided on the QuadMaster disk for setting the Quadboard's chronograph.

#### **Game Port**

The game port is designed to connect the Quadboard to a pair of joysticks or a game paddle. The port is fully IBM compatible. A short cable with a 15 pin DIP header at the Quadboard end and a female 15-pin D-type connector at the other end — plugged into the I/O connector bracket included in the Quadboard package — is provided for the interfacing.

## **DIP Switch and Jumpers**

An eight-position DIP switch is mounted on the Quadboard to allow you to program memory, parity, game port, and clock functions. With this DIP Switch you can:

- 1) Set the Quadboard's starting memory address;
- 2) Enable or disable the memory installed on the Quadboard;
- 3) Enable or disable parity checking of the Quadboard's memory;
- 4) Enable or disable the game port;
- 5) And enable or disable accessing of the Quadboard's chronograph.

## INSTALLATION

The Quadboard may be plugged into any slot in the Personal Computer. Refer to the IBM "Guide to Operations" manual for detailed instructions on opening the PC chassis and installing option boards.

WARNING: Be sure the Personal Computer is turned off before removing the cover. You may also wish to disconnect any power cables attached to the system. Never insert or remove an option board with the PC's power ON. Damage to the option board or PC could result.

Before installing the Quadboard in the Personal Computer certain programmable options need to be selected by setting appropriate DIP switch positions and establishing the appropriate jumpers on the board. These settings are explained in the following sections. Figure 2 shows the location and detail of the Quadboard's DIP Switch and Jumper options.

One of two types of DIP switches will be found on the Quadboard. One type has slide switches. These are On when the switch has been moved to the "ON" position or as indicated by the arrow. The switch is OFF when it is moved in the opposite direction.

The other type is a rocker switch. Here the switch is set to ON by rocking the switch down to the "ON" position or as indicated by the arrow. The switch is set to OFF by rocking it down in the opposite direction.




Figure 3 is a quick reference guide explaining each switch's function.


The Quadboard may be used as it is shipped from the factory, if this set-up meets your system requirements. When the Quadboard leaves the factory the DIP switch and jumpers are set as follows:

Quadboard Memory Starting Address	64K
Quadboard Memory Parity	OFF
Quadboard Memory	Enabled
Serial Port	COM1
Parallel Port	LPT1
Chronograph	Enabled
Game Port	Enabled

## **PC Memory Expansion**

Two DIP Switches on the IBM system board and one on the Quadboard must be set before the additional Quadboard memory can be used by the Personal Computer. The switches on the IBM system board are used to indicate the total amount of accessible memory. The switches on the Quadboard are used to set the starting address of the Quadboard's memory and to enable the installed memory. Reporting on Quadboard memory parity errors may also be enabled or disabled.

## **IBM PC System Board Switch Settings**

The IBM system board has two DIP switches that are used to indicate the total amount of memory installed in the Personal Computer. The total amount of installed memory includes the memory installed on the system board plus all that is installed in memory expansion cards. The system board's switches are labeled SW1 and SW2. These two switches should be set according to the IBM "Guide to Operations" manual. Please consult this manual for your personal computer switch settings.

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### **Quadboard Memory Switch Settings**

The Quadboard also has a DIP Switch that must be set before its memory can be utilized. This DIP Switch is used to set the starting address of the Quadboard's memory and enable the accessing of the installed memory. Memory parity may also be enabled or disabled. The DIP Switch is labeled SW1 and is located along the top edge of the Quadboard as it is installed in the PC. Figure 2 shows the actual location of the switch.

## **Quadboard Memory Starting Address**

The starting address of the Quadboard is switch-selectable in 64K increments. Before your Quadboard can be utilized in the PC, however, the system motherboard must be fully populated, i.e., a 16/64 system should contain 64K of RAM and a 64/256 system should be upgraded to 256K.

To do so, either contact your dealer or consult your computer's own guide to operations manual for system board memory expansion instructions.

If additional memory expansion boards are being used in your system, the Quadboard's starting address will normally begin where the others end. In other words, if you currently have a fully-populated 64K system board along with a 128K memory expansion board and are adding a Quadboard, set it's starting address to 192K.

## **Quadboard Memory Parity Enabling/Disabling**

DIP Switch position 3 is used for enabling or disabling the reporting of Quadboard memory parity errors to the system board. Selecting the OFF position keeps memory parity errors from being recognized by the system board. The ON position allows them to be recognized. The normal position for most users will be the ON position.

## **Asynchronous Communications (Serial) Interface**

The only set-up required for the serial port is the selection of its address and interrupt via the jumper pins located near the board's edge connector as shown in Figure 2. The serial port can be addressed as COM1 or COM2. It is functionally identical to IBM's serial port design. Table 3 lists the settings for programming the serial port.

If you're using the Quadboard in an IBM PC already equipped with an async adapter card addressed as COM1, remember to configure Quadboard's serial port as COM2 to prevent conflict between the two.

#### **Parallel Printer Port**

Included with the Quadboard is a 16 conductor printer cable with a 16 pin DIP header on one end and a female 25 pin D-type connector on the other end.

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


Fig. 6: Quadboard ready for installation

The 16 pin DIP header plugs into a mating 16 pin socket on the Quadboard. Figure 6 shows details of the 16 pin DIP Header installation. The DIP Header should be plugged into the socket with the blue conductor of the flat ribbon cable closest to the rear of the board and the brown conductor toward the front of the board.

Jumper pins 1, 2, and 3 are used to establish the address of the parallel printer port. It can be addressed as device LPT1 or LPT2.

#### **Game Port**

The Quadboard also features a game port. The game port has a 15 pin connector cable installed with a 15 pin DIP Header at one end and a 15 pin female D-type connector at the other end. The 15 pin Header plugs into a mating socket on the Quadboard (See Figure 6). It should be plugged in with the ribbon cable flowing upward.

#### **Bracket Installation**

When the Quadboard comes to you, the expansion port connectors are not installed in the bracket. You must do this to use the bracket. Installing the port connectors into the bracket is easy to do. A pair of needle nose pliers will help you with the task.

If you look at one of the expansion connectors you will notice two screw mounts on either side of the interface connector frame. These screw mounts are held in place on the other side of the connector frame by a lockwasher and a small nut. Remove these two screw mounts by turning the screw mount while you hold the nut in place with the needle nose pliers. When out, collect the screw mount, lockwasher, and the small nut and keep them together.

Next, insert the expansion port connector inside the bracket so that it protrudes through one of the matched expansion port openings on its front plate. Now take one of the removed screw mounts and insert it through its proper opening in the expansion port. Hold the connector in place while you are doing this or it may slide out of alignment. Then slip the lockwasher over the screw inside the bracket and then put on the nut over the washer and screw the expansion port in place. This installation procedure follows the screw mount removal procedure in reverse.

Repeat these steps for the expansion port's other screw mount.




Fig. 7: Quadboard installed and ready for bracket installation




Fig. 8: Attaching the bracket to the PC chassis




Fig. 9: The installed bracket

## **OPERATION**

Details of the operation of the Quadboard's hardware are discussed in the following sections. This information is provided for more advanced users or those who have special system requirements. However, the instructions in the installation section should be sufficient for most users.

NOTE: When the PC is first turned on, a check of all the installed memory is performed. This check typically takes about 15 seconds when 64K of memory is installed on the PC's system board. With a 384K Quadboard installed, this memory check can take as long as 60 seconds. Be prepared for a longer wait before the disk starts spinning when the PC is first turned on.

## **Quadboard Memory Enabling and Starting Address**

There are no special instructions or additional information for enabling the Quadboard's memory or for setting up the Quadboard starting address. As mentioned in Fig. 3A, Quadboard memory can be turned off by setting switch position 4 off.

## **Quadboard Memory Parity**

Quadboard memory parity is checked and errors reported via DIP Switch #3 (see Figure 3A); the position of the switch either enables or disables a parity check channel from the Quadboard to the system board.

While you may choose to enable parity checking as a standard feature, note that with SW3 "OFF," there is no parity check. Instead, an in-line register causes parity to appear consistently "good" when a Quadboard memory location is accessed; you may use this feature to your advantage and run programs which ordinarily lock up your system when parity errors do occur.

#### **Asynchronous Communications Interface**

As mentioned earlier, the serial port is virtually compatible with IBM's design for their asynchronous communications interface. However, there is one small difference and that is the 20 milliamp current loop interface option is not implemented on the Quadboard. Refer to the appropriate IBM manual for a description of the serial port's capabilities (i.e., baud rate, number of data bits, parity sense, etc.). BASIC and DOS provide simple commands for setting the serial port's programmable features. Additionally, a programmer can program the serial interface IC (an INS 8250 or equivalent) to meet any special needs. Table 5 lists the pins used on the serial interface connector. All listed signals are connected to the serial interface IC and may be read or controlled through this IC.

## **Parallel Printer Operation**

The parallel printer interface is a standard Centronics type interface. The design is functionally identical to IBM's design except for three seldom used signals that are not brought out: AUTO FD XT, ERROR, and SLCT IN. Table 6 lists the signals that are supported in the parallel printer interface.

## **Chronograph Operation**

The chronograph's battery is warranted to last five years; a typical lifetime is closer to ten years. The IBM PC can remain turned off for periods up to 6 months and the chronograph circuitry, powered by the battery, will continue to keep accurate time. The battery is recharged when the PC is turned on. An adjustment is provided for changing the chronograph's time base to make it run faster or slower.

The Quadboard's chronograph is used to load the PC's internal clock/calendar when DOS is booted. Software provided on the QuadMaster disk is used to read the Quadboard's chronograph circuitry, format the date and time into DOS, and store the date and time for use by the PC's internal clock/calendar.




#### Quadboard

Quadram's Quadboard is a ten-function expansion board for the IBM Personal Computer. It is designed to greatly increase the PC's capabilities for minimum cost while using only one internal expansion slot. The functions provided on this one board include: Random Access Memory (RAM) expansion from 64K to 384K bytes in 64K increments, an EIA RS-232C Serial Interface for asynchronous communications, a Centronics compatible parallel interface for printer driving, a battery-powered Quartz clock/calendar to keep your PC's internal clock always on time, a game port, an expansion port connector bracket, plus complete Quadmaster II software.



#### Quadboard II

Quadram's Quadboard II is an all-on-one board which combines six IBM PC functions in one. This multifunction board combines two serial ports, chronograph, and memory expansion — all compatible with IBM PC hardware. The two RC-232 async ports can be used for modems, printers, and other serial devices. Memory expansion is socketed and fully expandable in 64K increments up to 256K. Full parity generation and checking are standard. Also included is complete Quadmaster II software.



#### Quad 512+

Now IBM PC owners can enjoy faster computing times and more capabilities with the Quad 512+. This board from Quadram combines memory expansion of 512K RAM in increments of 64K, 256K, or 512K with a serial port. The RS-232 async serial port uses the same chip as the IBM serial board and is used for connecting modems, printers, and other serial devices. Also included is complete Quadmaster II software.



#### Microfazer

The Quadram Microfazer is a univeral print buffer with 8K to 512K RAM — the first with a half-megabyte! The Microfazer receives information in its memory, then sends it to the printer at an appropriate speed. The Microfazer comes with a copy feature allowing additional copies of the buffered information. The unit is sized to stack with popular modems and other peripherals; and some even plug directly into the printer!



#### Quadchrome


#### InterFazer


#### Quadscreen

#### Quad I/O



Quadram presents Quadcolor, the most powerful color graphics adapter package available today. Quadcolor is compatible with the Personal Computer and XT and comes in two versions.



#### Quadlink




#### IPIC


#### **Memory Expansion Board**

Perfectly compatible with other peripheral cards, Quadram's Memory Expansion Board is designed to increase the random access memory capacity of the IBM Personal Computer in 64K byte increments up to 192K. The Memory Expansion board has been manufactured with performance and reliability in mind, and has been constructed of only high-quality material and components. Each board has been burned-in and thoroughly tested to insure many years of dependable service.



#### Clock/Calendar

The Clock/Calendar Card from Quadram Corporation is a small plug-in unit designed for the IBM Personal Computer. It provides an accurate crystal-controlled date/time keeping function which automatically sets the IBM DOS internal clock/calendar whenever DOS is booted from a diskette. The card is powered by a self-contained battery automatically recharged by the computer, and provides continuous time keeping even when the computer is off for long periods of time.



#### **APIC Graphics**

The Apple Parallel Interface Card is manufactured by the Quadram Corporation as a Centronics compatible parallel interface for the Apple II and Apple II+ computers. The card contains a graphics option. Both Apple Graphics pages can be printed from the screen with several simple commands.

APIC-G has many text features, including adjustable margins, page length, line length, and others. APIC-G is available for several types of printers.

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
