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
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
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Introduction

### 1. INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the TeleVideo world of personal computers! Your new computer is designed to meet a wide variety of needs from word ' processing, accounting, and data base management to allowing you to write your own software programs.

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You don't need to be an electronics engineer to set up your computer! This User's Manual provides an easy step-by-step procedure for setting up and turning on your TS 1605 computer system.

Please take the time to read the installation instructions and familiarize yourself with the operation of your computer.

#### FEATURES

Your new TS 1605 computer is versatile, easy to use, and provides many paths for future growth. Below is a partial list of the benefits from its many design features.

- \* The TS 1605 is IBM Personal Computer (IBM PC) compatible, allowing you to use over 1300 software programs written for the IBM PC
- \* The adjustable green display screen is easy on the eyes
- \* The cooling tower design eliminates the need for a noisy fan
- \* The detached keyboard allows you to move the keyboard to a comfortable position
- \* A separate numeric keypad provides easy numeric entry in accounting applications
- Ten programmable function keys allow programs to use the function keys to perform specific tasks and/or allow easy entry of program commands
- \* The TS 1605 has built-in connectors allowing you to connect a printer and a modem without having to buy additional computer hardware (except for cables)
- \* A built-in IBM-format expansion slot allows you to add an option board built for the IBM into the TS 1605 case without having to buy additional computer hardware
- \* An optional 1605N card allows you to connect the TS 1605 to any of TeleVideo's network or multi-user systems

#### USER'S MANUAL FORMAT

Several conventions are used throughout this manual. Special notes are used to draw your attention to important information. Special symbols are used to represent particular keys in various instructions.

#### Special Notes

Two types of notes call attention to information of special importance:

**NOTE!** General note emphasizing important information.

STOP! Note giving information concerning possible damage to the computer system or possible loss of data. When you see these, STOP and read the note before proceeding.

### Notation Conventions

The symbols in Table 1-1 are used throughout the manual to describe keys you are to press.

### Symbol Description

- <XXX> A word or abbreviation within these symbols (<>) indicates a key on the keyboard.
- <CR> The carriage return symbol indicates that you are to press the <ENTER> key. The <ENTER> key is marked with an angled left arrow and located on the right side of the keyboard (where the return key would be on a typewriter) above the <PRTSC> key.
- / This symbol, when used between two or more keys, indicates that you are to press the keys simultaneously. For example, <CTRL>/<BREAK> indicates you are to press the <CTRL> and <BREAK> keys at the same time.

#### ADDITIONAL MANUALS

TeleVideo also makes available a Technical Reference Manual for the TS 1605. This manual provides a description of the computer hardware and programming information for the system level programmer.

2. SETUP


Your TS 1605 was tested and inspected at the TeleVideo factory before it was packed for shipment. Inspect it carefully for possible shipping damage. Make sure you have received all the items checked on the packing list.

After identifying the parts of your computer, follow the directions outlined in this chapter to set it up. This includes finding a suitable location, checking and attaching the components, checking the switch settings, and determining the power requirements.

## SELECTING THE RIGHT LOCATION

Select a sturdy, level surface. Leave at least four inches of free space around the computer for proper air flow.

#### Environment

The TS 1605 operates best at temperatures and humidity levels in which you are also comfortable. Sudden and drastic temperature changes may adversely affect your stored data.

Computers require a clean environment--free of contaminants such as dust, smoke, and carpet fuzz. Excessive moisture or oil particles in the air can hinder the performance. Keep your computer away from the floor where dust or carpet fuzz would be more likely to get into the floppy disk drives.

#### Setup


Locate your computer at least five feet from other computing ' equipment, electrical appliances, or equipment such as elevators, radio transmitters, or telephones, that generate magnetic fields.

### SETTING UP YOUR COMPUTER

After selecting a good location, you are ready to set up your TS 1605.


Figure 2-2 Keyboard Connection

1. Place the keyboard in front of the computer. Plug the telephone-type coiled cable that is connected to the front of the computer into the phone jack outlet on the back of the keyboard as illustrated in Figure 2-2.


- 2. Check the section settings on the switch labeled SW on the back panel of the computer. The switch should be set as shown in Figure 2-3.
  - NOTE! If the switch settings do not match Figure 2-3, refer to Appendix F for information on changing the settings.



3. Locate the ON/OFF power switch on the rear panel of the computer (see Figure 2-4). Make sure the power switch is in the OFF position by pressing the plain end of the switch.






- **STOP!** If you are using the TS 1605 on the 230 volt international power standard, refer to Appendix D to change the voltage setting and fuse from 115 VAC to 230 VAC before proceeding to the following sections.
- 4. Take the power cord you received with the TS 1605 and plug it into the back of the computer as shown in Figure 2-5.

Plug the other end of the power cord into an electrical outlet. The power cord has a three-prong plug and requires a three-prong electrical outlet. If you use a two-prong adapter, ground the adapter to the outlet with a pigtail as illustrated in Figure 2-5.


**STOP!** Incorrect or fluctuating line voltages can cause diskette data errors or damage to the system. If you have any doubt about the line voltage at your location, talk to your computer store representative.

5. Position the display screen by tilting it up or down. Use the flat knob on the left side of the computer to tighten the screen into position as illustrated in Figure 2-6.

### PERIPHERALS

Your TS 1605 computer has built-in connectors ready to connect to **peripherals** such as a parallel printer or a modem. Chapter 7 includes information about how to connect peripherals to the TS 1605.



### 3. OPERATION


This chapter provides a step-by-step guide for turning your computer on and loading the operating system into memory. The operating system is a group of programs that control the operation of the TS 1605.

### POWER ON

Now that your computer is set up correctly as described in Chapter 2, you are ready to turn your computer on.

- Turn the disk drive latches to the vertical position and remove the shipping cardboard. Save the cardboard inserts for possible reshipping.
- 2. Turn on your computer by locating the power switch on the back of the computer (see Figure 3-1) and pressing the end of the power switch that has the white dot.

3. Listen for a beep after five to ten seconds. The beep indicates that the power is on and the computer has performed a set of self-tests. If a failure is detected during the self-test, an error message will be displayed on the screen listing the hardware subsystem that failed.

# Operation

Upon successful completion of the self-test, the following message appears at the top of the screen within 20 to 30 seconds:

Disk error or non-system disk Hit any key to retry


This message indicates that the TS 1605 did not find an operating system diskette in the upper disk drive (drive A). This message is expected, since you have not inserted an operating system diskette into the disk drive.

NOTE! If the above message does not appear, or an error message appears, turn the computer off, wait a moment, and then turn it back on. If the message does not appear, or an error message appears again, call your computer store.

### Adjusting the Contrast

If the characters on the screen appear faint and hard to read, adjust the contrast by turning the contrast knob on the rear panel of the computer. Figure 3-2 shows the location of the contrast knob.

Figure 3-2 Contrast Knob




### OPERATING SYSTEM

An operating system is a group of programs that control all the basic functions of the computer, including supervising the use of applications programs. TeleVideo sells the TeleDOS operating system for use with the TS 1605. TeleDOS is based on the MS-DOS operating system.

The operating system must be entered (loaded) into the computer from a diskette before software programs can be run. The following steps tell you how to load the operating system into the TS 1605 memory after you turn the computer on.

- Remove the operating system diskette from its paper dust jacket.
- 2. Insert the operating system diskette into drive A (the top disk drive) with the labeled side facing to the left. Push it in gently. If the diskette seems to catch on an edge, pull it back out slightly and push it gently in again. Move the drive latch to the horizontal position and press the <SPACE BAR>.

3. The TS 1605 loads the operating system from the diskette into memory. To use the operating system, follow the instructions in the operating system user's manual. The instructions for starting TeleDOS can be found in Chapter 2 of the TeleDOS User's Manual.

### TURNING THE COMPUTER OFF

The following procedures should always be followed when turning the TS 1605 off.

- 1. Turn the drive latches to the vertical position.
- 2. Remove any diskettes from the disk drives.
- 3. Turn off the power by pressing the plain end of the power switch.
- STOP! ALWAYS TURN THE LATCHES ON THE DISK DRIVES TO THE VERTICAL POSITION BEFORE TURNING THE POWER TO THE COMPUTER ON OR OFF. When power is turned ON or OFF there may be a momentary surge of power through some of the system's circuits. Turning the drive latches to the vertical position at power-on or power-off positions the disk drive heads away from the diskette, preventing accidental erasures.

### 4. THE KEYBOARD

The TS 1605 keyboard is divided into three sections: the main keyboard, the numeric keypad, and the function keys. The main keyboard looks very similar to a typewriter, with the addition of some keys that perform special computer functions. The numeric keypad provides easy numeric data entry while using accounting applications programs.

#### THE MAIN KEYBOARD

Key positions in the main keyboard are similar to a standard typewriter. Unlike a typewriter, the alphanumeric and punctuation keys are typematic, meaning if they are held down, the character is automatically repeated. The main keyboard also contains keys that perform special (control) functions for the TS 1605. Many of the control functions are defined by the operating system or applications program, and therefore may vary with the program being used. Table 4-1 lists the functions of these control keys, starting at the <ESC> key and moving counterclockwise around the main keyboard.

# Table 4-1 Main Keyboard Special Keys

### Description



The <ESC> (escape) key is used for special program control functions.



The <TAB> key moves the cursor to the next program defined tab position.



The <CTRL> (control) key is used by programs for many special control functions.



The main keyboard has two <SHIFT> keys. Pressing either of the <SHIFT> keys shifts the alphanumeric and punctuation keys to the upper-case mode. Alphabet characters are displayed as capital letters. All other character keys when pressed with the <SHIFT> key, display the character shown on the upper portion of the key. If the uppercase mode has been set with the <CAPS LOCK> key, the <SHIFT> keys shift the alphabet characters to lower-case.



The <ALT> (alternate) key is used for special program control functions.



The <SPACE BAR> is used to add a blank character. The computer treats a blank like an alphanumeric character.

## Description

CAPS LOCK The <CAPS LOCK> key locks characters A through Z in the upper-case mode. Pressing <CAPS LOCK> again returns you to the lower-case mode. The caps lock key switches or toggles between lowerand upper-case for the characters A through Z.



Pressing the <SHIFT> key and <PRTSC> (print screen) key simultaneously (<SHIFT>/<PRTSC>) sends a copy of the information displayed on the screen to the printer.



The use of the <ENTER> or <CR> (carriage return) key is defined by the operating system or applications program being used. In TeleDOS, the enter key is used to send a command to the operating system for execution. Refer to the appropriate manual for its specific function.



The <BACKSPACE> erases the character to the left of the cursor and moves the cursor one position to the left.

# NUMERIC KEYPAD

The TS 1605 has numeric keypad keys that can be operated in two ways: as typical numerical keys for accounting applications, or as cursor movement and editing keys. You can use the <NUM LOCK> key to switch or toggle between the two modes.

### Keyboard

The functions of the cursor movement and editing keys are defined (determined) by the operating system or applications program being used. Table 4-2 lists the intended use of these keys.

**NOTE!** TeleDOS does not use the cursor movement or editing key functions of the numeric keypad.

# Table 4-2 Numeric Keypad Intended Functions

Key

Description



The <NUM LOCK> (number lock) key switches or toggles the numeric keypad between the numeric key functions and the cursor movement/editing key functions.



The <SCROLL LOCK> or <BREAK> key is used for special program control functions.



The <HOME> key moves the cursor to the upper-left corner of the screen, called the Home position.



The <CURSOR UP> key moves the cursor to the character position one line above its current position.



The <PGUP> (page up) key scrolls the screen up one screen display.



The <CURSOR LEFT> key moves the cursor one character position to the left without deleting any characters.



The <CURSOR RIGHT> key moves the cursor one character position to the right without deleting any characters.

END

The <END> key moves the cursor one character position to the right of the last character on the line the cursor is currently on.

The <CURSOR DOWN> key moves the cursor to the character position one line below the current cursor position.

3 PG DN The <PGDN> (page down) key scrolls the screen down one screen display.



The plus and minus keys have no program-defined functions. When pressed, they enter a plus or minus character on the screen.

The <INS> (insert) key switches or toggles between the insert and overwrite modes. In the insert mode, a character typed at the keyboard is inserted into the current line at the cursor position and all characters to the right of the cursor are moved one position to the right. In the overwrite mode, a character typed at the keyboard replaces the character at the cursor position.

> The <DEL> (delete) key deletes the character at the current cursor position. All characters to the right of the deleted character are moved one position to the left.

#### FUNCTION KEYS

The function keys, labeled F1 through F10, are always controlled by the program being used. Many (but not all) applications programs use the function keys to perform special functions to make the program easier to use. To find out the functions assigned to the function keys, refer to the user's manual for that particular program.

# SPECIAL KEY COMBINATIONS

Certain key combinations perform special functions for the TS 1605 regardless of the program being used. Table 4-3 lists the key combinations and their functions.

# Table 4-3 Special Key Combinations

Keys	Function	Description
<ctrl>/<alt>/<del></del></alt></ctrl>	Reset	Stops all program activity and the computer loads the operating system from the diskette in drive A.
<ctrl>/<num lock=""></num></ctrl>	Pause	Stops the scrolling of the screen display so you can read the screen. Press any character key to continue.
<ctrl>/<break></break></ctrl>	Break	Interrupts current program activity and returns to the operating system or applications program (the return point is determined by the program or operating system).

### 5. RUNNING APPLICATIONS PROGRAMS

The TS 1605 is designed to run many different types of applications programs, including those written for the IBM Personal Computer (IBM PC). Applications programs can range from general purpose programs like word processing and financial planning to programs for specific tasks like real estate investment, medical or dental records, or payroll. 

Due to the wide variety of applications programs available, there is no one set of instructions that can be given that will work to start every program. To load and run your applications program, refer to the user's manual that you received with the program.




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
6. WORKING WITH DISKETTES

Floppy diskettes contain the software or programs that run your computer. Diskettes are used to store operating systems, applications programs, text, and data. Figures 6-1 and 6-2 show the parts of a floppy diskette.

Figure 6-1 Floppy Diskette








When you put a diskette into the disk drive and close the drive, the disk drive spins the diskette inside its cover. There is a drive recording head on each side of the diskette that is lowered onto the magnetic diskette surface whenever the drive is closed. The disk drive head moves back and forth along the diskette access slot as it reads from or writes to the diskette.

# HANDLING AND STORING DISKETTES


Diskettes can provide reliable service if you follow these simple rules:



Return diskettes to their paper dust jacket when not in use. Store diskettes in an upright position in a dust-free storage container.



Do not touch the exposed recording surface of the diskette. Small scratches, dust, food, or tobacco particles may make information on your diskette unusable.




Use a felt-tip pen and press lightly. Never write on the diskette label with a pencil or ballpoint pen. Whenever possible, write information on the label before placing the label on the diskette.




Never attach anything to the diskette or its dust jacket with paperclips or staples.



Never bend or fold diskettes.



Keep diskettes away from sources of magnetic fields such as telephones, magnetic paper clip holders, typewriters, or electronic calculators.



Store diskettes in a cool place, away from direct sunlight or sources of heat.

### FORMATTING DISKETTES

Since each computer system has its own format requirements, blank diskettes are not formatted by diskette manufacturers. Before a new diskette is used, it must be formatted for the TS 1605.

The format process prepares a diskette to receive information. It checks the diskette for bad spots and builds a directory to hold information about the files that will eventually be stored on the diskette.

**NOTE!** The format process will erase any data currently on a diskette.

To format a diskette for the TS 1605, you can use the FORMAT utility program command described in Chapter 2 of the TeleDOS operating system User's Manual.

### BACKING UP DISKETTES

When diskettes work perfectly and you don't accidentally erase or change data, it is perhaps difficult to understand why back-up diskettes are so necessary. However, accidents do happen and diskettes eventually wear out. To protect your investment of time and effort, learn to make a backup copy of each diskette on a regular basis. You can use the DISKCOPY utility program command described in Chapter 2 of the TeleDOS operating system User's Manual to copy diskettes.

#### **COPYING MASTER DISKETTES**

When you purchase software, you receive it on a **master diskette**. The diskette that your operating system came on is a master diskette. It is important to copy master diskettes before starting to use them. Always use the copies for normal use and keep the original master diskettes as a backup in case a working copy is damaged or wears out.

To copy master diskettes, you can use the DISKCOPY utility program command described in Chapter 2 of the TeleDOS operating system User's Manual.

#### WRITE-PROTECTING DISKETTES

When information from one diskette is copied onto another diskette, it superimposes the new data on the information originally there. If the information on a diskette, such as your system diskette, is particularly important, you may want to protect it from being copied over by write-protecting the diskette.

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#### Diskettes

To write-protect a diskette, place one of the self-adhesive tabs that are supplied by manufacturers with each box of blank diskettes over the write-protect notch (see Figure 6-1). With the tab in place, the drive is not allowed to write information on the diskette. When you want to remove the protection, remove the tab from the diskette.

Of all the habits which you can develop as a computer user, probably the careful handling of diskettes and the faithful backing up of data are the most desirable.



# 7. CONNECTING PERIPHERALS

The TS 1605 comes equipped with built-in connectors for attaching a printer and modem. This chapter provides instructions for connecting a printer or modem to these connectors.

#### ATTACHING CABLES

Cables are needed to connect peripherals to your computer. The types of cables needed are determined by the requirements of the peripheral devices. Your computer store representative can supply the appropriate cables for attaching peripheral devices.


# Figure 7-1 D-Shaped Cable Connector

Cable connectors have D-shaped end connectors (see Figure 7-1). These fit onto the D-shaped pin connectors on the rear panel of your computer. To install a cable, fit the pin connector onto the rear-panel connector, then gently but firmly push the cable connector on.

Some connectors come supplied with mounting screws in the flange on the sides of the D-connector housing. These screws line up with the threaded holes in the rear panel connectors. The screws need only be finger tightened. This prevents a cable from being accidently pulled from the computer.

Leave some slack as you connect the cables. If you are using a round cable, coil it loosely and secure it with a rubberband. If you are using a flat, ribbon cable, fold it accordion-style as shown in Figure 7-2. Coiling ribbon cable can adversely affect system performance.

#### PARALLEL PRINTERS

The connector on the back of the TS 1605, labeled **PARALLEL PRINTER**, is designed to connect to a Centronics-type parallel printer. The PARALLEL PRINTER connector uses a 25-pin D-shell connector instead of the standard 36-pin parallel printer cable connector (see Appendix E for connector pin assignments); therefore, a special printer cable is needed. Your computer store representative can supply you with the correct cable for connecting your printer to the TS 1605.

When you get the proper printer cable, you can connect the printer by attaching the 25-pin connector end of the cable to the PARALLEL PRINTER connector and the other end to the connector on the printer.

For information on operating your printer, refer to the user's manual that was supplied with your printer.

#### MODEMS

The connector on the back of the TS 1605, labeled RS-232C, is designed to connect to a modem. The RS-232C connector uses a standard 25-pin D-shell connector (see Appendix E for connector pin assignments). To connect a modem, attach one end of an RS-232C cable to the connector labeled RS-232C and the other end to the modem's RS-232C connector.

To operate the modem, refer to the manuals supplied with the modem and communications software package you are using.

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### 8. INSTALLING OPTION BOARDS


Option boards can be installed into the TS 1605 to add features or enhancements to your computer. Examples are memory boards to expand memory beyond 256K, a 1605N card for connecting the TS 1605 into one of TeleVideo's network systems, or the board for the optional expansion unit, giving you four additional expansion slots.

This chapter explains how to install an option board into the case of the TS 1605. Option boards are installed piggy-back fashion on the main system board and require major disassembly of the TS 1605 case. IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT OPTION BOARDS BE INSTALLED BY A QUALIFIED TECHNICIAN.

The following is a step-by-step procedure for installing an option board. A Phillips screw driver is required for the installation.


- 1. Turn off the power and unplug the power cord from the power source (wall outlet).
- 2. Place the TS 1605 system on a workbench or table with at least a 3 x 3 foot work area. Position the TS 1605 with the floppy drive end of the case facing you (the right side).
- 3. Remove the three Phillips head screws and flat washers located along the lower edge of the case (see Figure 1).

Figure 8-1 Location of Case Screws




4. Open the case by pulling out and up from the bottom as if it were hinged at the top (see Figure 8-2). There are tabs on the top of the side case that fit into slots in the main system case. Once the side case is approximately 30 degrees to the main system case, the side case can be removed from the main system case. Carefully set the side case down flat.

Figure 8-2 Removing the Side Case




 Disconnect the disk drive power cable connectors from the disk drives (see Figure 8-3).

Figure 8-3 Disconnecting the Disk Drive Cables




- 6. Disconnect the disk drive interface ribbon cable by removing the cable connectors from the disk drives (see Figure 8-3).
- 7. Disconnect the black ground wires between the main unit and the disk drives by removing the screws attaching them to the metal housing in the side case.
- 8. The side case containing the disk drives can now be moved aside to allow easier access to the system board. Cover the side case to prevent foreign material from entering the disk drives.
- 9. If the option board has a rear panel connector, the cover in the rear panel shroud has to be removed. To remove the cover, squeeze together the three sets of hook-like clips and push the cover out the back of the shroud.

10. Remove the three Phillips head screws attaching the top option board bracket to the standoffs on the system board. Remove the bracket from the system board.


Figure 8-5 System Board



11. Loosen the option board attaching screw on the top bracket. Attach the bracket to the option board by sliding the body of the attaching screw into the slot on the option board retaining bracket and fitting the plastic guide over the top edge of the option board (see Figure 8-6).

- 12. Remove the two Phillips head screws attaching the lower option board bracket from the standoffs on the system board. You do not need to disconnect the ribbon cable for the edge connector socket.
- 13. Install the option board edge connector into the edge connector socket on the lower bracket (see Figure 8-7).






Figure 8-8 Positioning the Option Board

- 14. Move the option board into position (with the two brackets attached - see Figure 8-8). Install the three screws attaching the top bracket to the standoffs on the system board. Make sure the middle and right mounting screws go through the top two holes in the thin plastic ribbon cable protector, and the protector is in place between the standoffs and the bracket.

Figure 8-7 Attaching the Edge Connector Bracket

- 15. Install the two screws attaching the lower bracket to the standoffs on the system board. The mounting screws will also go through the lower mounting holes of the thin plastic ribbon cable protector.
- 16. Move the side case with the disk drives into position in front of the main system.
- 17. Connect the disk drive interface ribbon cable to the connectors on the disk drives (see Figure 8-3).
- Connect the power supply cable connectors to the disk drives (see Figure 8-3).
- 19. Connect the black ground wires to the metal housing in the side case.
- 20. Lift the side case into position, inserting the tabs on the top of the side case into the slots in the top of the main case. Pivot the case down into position.
- 21. Replace the three case screws and washers.

### 9. CARING FOR THE TS 1605

To keep your TS 1605 in the best condition, keep it clean and inspect it periodically.

### CARE

- When not in use, place a dust cover over the computer to prevent dust from entering the computer through the cooling vents.
- 2. Periodically vacuum the keyboard with a soft brush attachment (or use a small soft brush).
- 3. Clean the housing with a soft, lint-free cloth.

#### INSPECTION

Check the cabinet and keyboard for damage or excessive wear periodically.

- 1. Inspect the cabinet for cracks or breaks.
- 2. Check each keyboard key for free movement.
- 3. Inspect the cables and pin connectors twice a year for damage. Inspect the cable connectors for kinks or other signs of excessive stress (such as stretching).

Refer any damage to a qualified service technician at your computer store.

### SERVICE

If you need to call your computer store for service, you will be asked for the serial number of your computer. The serial number is located on a label on the back of the computer. For future reference, write the serial number, the date you took delivery, and the name and phone number of your computer store and service center in the space provided on the inside of the rear cover of this manual.

#### Care

### Service During Warranty

Your computer is under warranty as described in the front of the manual. If you need service on your TS 1605 while it is under TeleVideo's limited warranty, call your computer store representative for information.

### **On-Site Service After Warranty**

You can obtain on-site service after warranty from authorized third-party service centers.

### SHIPPING THE TS 1605

Should you need to ship the TS 1605, follow these steps:

- 1. Open the drive latches. If you kept the cardboard inserts that were in the drives when the TS 1605 was shipped, reinsert them now. If you did not keep the inserts, you can place a blank diskette in each drive. Turn the drive latches to the horizontal position to close the drives.
- 2. Pack the unit in the original TeleVideo shipping container or use other suitable materials.

### **10. MAINTENANCE**

This chapter provides you with some procedures to try if your computer is not working properly, along with instructions on how to change the fuse.

#### TROUBLESHOOTING

The information provided in Table 10-1 may enable you to resolve operating problems without placing a service call. If your computer does not work properly after you have followed the suggestions given here, call your computer store or service center.

# Table 10-1 Troubleshooting Procedures

### Problem

#### Action

THE COMPUTER IS NOT OPERATIONAL AFTER THE POWER SWITCH IS TURNED ON. Unplug the power cord and plug it in again.

Test for power by plugging something else in the same electrical outlet.

Check the line fuse (as described in the section Changing the Fuse in this chapter) and replace it if necessary. If the fuse blows again, call your computer store.

Remove the system diskette and

DATE PROMPT DOES NOT APPEAR AFTER TeleDOS HAS BEEN LOADED

reinsert it. Hold the diskette with the label facing left and the write-protect notch down. Turn the drive latch to the horizontal position and reset the system by pressing the <CTRL>/<ALT>/<DEL> simultaneously.

Try using the master system diskette. If that works, make a new working copy.

#### Problem

Check to see that the appropriate diskette is in the active drive.

Be sure the latch on the active drive is in the horizontal position.

Make sure the keyboard is properly connected.

Adjust display contrast settings on the rear panel.

Make sure the keyboard is properly connected.

Reset the TS 1605 by pressing <CTRL>/<ALT>/<DEL>.

Turn the computer off and check the fuse.

Reconnect printer cable, being sure it is completely on the pin connector.

Check printer cable configuration.

Check for printer fault (out of paper or ribbon).

Unplug the modem and plug it in again. Turn its power on and off, and reconnect the modem cable to the RS-232C port.

Make sure the modem and computer are operating at the same baud rate.

#### CHANGING THE FUSE

The computer has one exterior fuse that is accessible from the rear panel.





Figure 10-2 Good Fuse


Figure 10-3 Blown Fuse

To check or change the exterior fuse, turn the power off, unplug the cord from the the power outlet, and unscrew the fuse holder (see Figure 10-1). The fuse is a small glass cylinder. If the thin wire inside the fuse is still intact, the fuse should be functional (see Figure 10-2). If the thin wire is broken and/or if the glass is blackened, the fuse has blown and must be replaced (see Figure 10-3).

**STOP!** Do not replace a blown fuse until you know what caused the fuse to blow. The problem could be with the system or with the power outlet.

Figure 10-1 Exterior Fuse Location

To replace the fuse, slip the old fuse from the fuse holder and insert a new fuse. See Appendix D for information about fuse ratings. You can purchase new fuses from your computer store. If the newly-replaced fuse blows out immediately, do not replace it with another fuse. Call your computer store.

The TS 1605 is set at TeleVideo for use with the 115 volt power standard. To use the TS 1605 on the 230 volt international power standard, you must change the line fuse and change the setting of the power switch on the back of the TS 1605. This appendix explains how to change the fuse and voltage switch.

Be sure that the power is off and and the power cord is disconnected from the power outlet before making the following changes.

Inserting the Fuse for 230 Volts


The system is shipped with the fuse installed to correspond to 115 volts. A .75A slow blow fuse is needed for operation on the 230 volt International power standard.

Unscrew the fuse holder from the back panel of the unit and remove the 1.5A fuse. Place one end of the .75A fuse into the holder and insert the fuse into the unit. Press gently while screwing the holder back into place. See Figure D-1.

Figure D-1 Fuse




### Changing the Voltage Switch to 230 Volts

To change the voltage configuration to 230 volts, you need to switch the voltage switch on the back panel of the Computer.

The voltage switch is locked into place by a bar that is removable. To remove the bar and switch from 115V to 230V, follow these directions.

 Using a Phillips screwdriver, remove the screw from the bottom of the bar that spans the 230V side of the switch. See Figure D-2.

- 2. Carefully remove the bar.
- 3. Firmly push the switch to the 230V position (to the right).
- 4. Fit the top horizontal section of the bar carefully into the slot above the 115V position. Match the screw hole of the bar with that under the 115V position.
- 5. Insert and tighten screw.
  - STOP! Contact your computer store if you are not sure that your power requirements match that of the unit. Trying to operate the unit with the wrong power configuration can seriously damage the system.

**STOP!** DO NOT USE A PENCIL! Pencil lead is an electrical conductor, and any small grains of lead falling into the switch sections may cause a malfunction.

### APPENDIX G COLOR MONITOR CONNECTORS

Your TS 1605 comes standard with connectors for color monitors. These connectors allow you to connect a color monitor and operate both the standard display and the color display at the same time. The connectors are labeled COMP and RGB for a composite and RGB (Red/Green/Blue) color monitor respectively.

To use a color monitor, connect it to the proper TS 1605 back panel connector with an appropriate cable (the type of cable you need depends on your color monitor, composite or RGB, and the cable connector on your monitor). Plug the color monitor into a power outlet and turn its power switch to the ON position. Now start your TS 1605 as you normally would. The screen display on your TS 1605 is duplicated on the screen of the color monitor.

The COMP connector is a standard RCA-type phono jack with signal and ground lines as shown in Table G-1.

# APPENDIX H TIPS FOR USING OPTION BOARDS WITH ASYNCHRONOUS COMMUNICATIONS

Your TS 1605 comes equipped with an RS-232C port (connector) for asynchronous communications. This port is internally addressed as the COM1 port. If you add an option board that uses asynchronous communications (such as a modem board, or a memory board with a serial port), this board is considered a second asynchronous communications port and must be configured as COM2. The documentation supplied with your option board should explain how to configure the board, or serial port on the board, as COM2 (or disable the extra serial port if it will not be used).

Serial output through the RS-232C connector on the back panel of the TS 1605 will not occur properly if another asynchronous port exists in the system configured as COM1.

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
