Introduction

Congratulations on the purchase of your new Xerox Personal Computer (PC) -- one of the most powerful and versatile computers on the market today.

Whether you are an experienced user or new to computers, we want you to feel thoroughly comfortable with your system. This manual will explain how to set up your system, how to verify that it is working properly, and even how to move it when the need arises.

When choosing a place for your system, remember to avoid exposing it to the following:

- direct sunlight or objects which radiate heat
- . excessive dust
- electrical "noise" or devices that cause excessive voltage variations, such as air conditioners, fans, or high-frequency security devices
- static electricity, which may be produced by a plastic table or nylon carpeting.

The following pages will explain how to unpack your system. If you anticipate a major move in the near future, you may want to save the packing materials.

Unpacking the System





Figure 1-3. Remove the processor.

3. Pull the processor with its protective end pieces from the carton.



Figure 1-4. Remove the protective end pieces.

4. Carefully remove the end pieces from each end of the processor.

5. Remove the protective plastic wrapping.

6. Place the processor on a desk or table.

Note: Look at the bottom of your processor to locate your processor's serial number. Write this umber down and file it for future reference, as you will need to refer to it if you should ever need to call your service representative.

Compare the floppy disk drive(s) on your processor with the illustration above. If you have a hard disk system, there will only be one floppy drive.

7. Repeat the previous steps with the other boxes.

Note: If your system came with a mouse device, be sure you **keep** the gray card that is packed inside the mouse box.

When your system is set up, it will look something like Fig. 1-7 above, which illustrates a processor with dual floppy disk drives, PC keyboard, and color display. The mouse and the printer are optional.

System Options

You may have purchased one or more of the options shown in Fig. 1-8. System options include communications boards, like the Modem Option Board or the ASA Communications Adapter Board, network access boards, and a memory board. You might also have a co-processor (8087-2) or memory chips to increase your system's memory.

If you have system options to install, turn to **Section 2: Options,** beginning on page 2-1. Then return to page 1-7 to complete the remaining instructions in this Section.

If you do not have system options to install, go to **Installing the Basic System**, p.1-7.

Installing the Basic System





The steps below are for installing a partial-page (25 line) monochrome display. If you have a color display to install, turn to page 1-10. If you have a full-page (66 line) display, turn to page 1-14.

- 3. Connect the monochrome display to the processor.
 - Place the display on top of the processor.
 - Look at the end of the plug on the display cable. Notice that the ring around the pins is wider on one side. Turn the plug so that the wider side is on the left, as shown in Fig 1-11.
 - Insert the display plug (matching plug to connector) into the CRT connector at the rear of the processor.
 - Secure the connection by tightening the two screws on both sides of the plug. Take care not to overtighten the screws.
 - When finished, go to Step 11 on page 1-16.

The steps below are for installing a color display. If you have a partial-page monochrome display to install, turn to page 1-9. If you have a full-page display, turn to page 1-14.

4. Look at the back of your color display to determine whether you have the display illustrated in Fig. 1-12 or the display illustrated in Fig. 1-13. (Notice that the display cable is not attached to the former unit, but is attached to the latter.)

If you have the display pictured in Fig. 1-12, go to Step 5. Go to Step 6 if you have the display pictured in Fig. 1-13.

- 5. Connect the color display cable to the processor.
 - Place the display on top of the processor.
 - Locate the display cable. Notice that there is a different plug at each end of the cable. The end with the pins connects to the back of the processor; the end with the holes connects to the back of the display.
 - Look at the end of the plug with the pins. Notice that the ring around the pins is wider on one side. Turn the plug so that the wider side faces left, as shown in Fig. 1-12.

- Insert the plug (matching plug to connector) into the connector marked CRT at the rear of the processor and tighten the screws.
- Look at the end of the other plug. Notice that it too is wider on one side. Turn the plug so that the wider side is up (Fig. 1-12).
- Insert the plug into the connector at the bottom left corner of the rear of the display (Fig. 1-12). Tighten the screws.
- Go to Step 7.

- 6. Connect the color display cable to the processor.
 - . Place the display on top of the processor.
 - Look at the plug on the end of the display cable. Notice that the ring around the pins is wider on one side. Turn the plug so that the wider side faces left, as shown in Fig. 1-13.
 - Insert the plug (matching plug to connector) into the connector marked **CRT** at the rear of the processor and tighten the screws.
 - . Go to Step 8.

- 7. Connect the color display's power cord to the processor.
 - Locate the display's power cord. (It is shorter and thinner than the processor's power cord.)
 - Insert the female plug into the power socket on the back of the display unit, and the male (pronged) plug into the power socket on the rear of the processor (Fig. 1-14).
 - Press both plugs firmly into place.
 - . Go to Step 11 on p. 1-16.

Caution: Never plug the display's power cord into a wall outlet; always plug it into the processor.

- 8. Connect the color display's power cord to the processor.
 - Locate the display's power cord. (It is shorter and thinner than the processor's power cord.)
 - Locate the power socket beneath the left rear corner of the display (Fig. 1-15). Insert the female plug into this power socket, and the male (pronged) plug into the power socket on the rear of the processor (Fig. 1-15).
 - Press both plugs firmly into place.
 - . Go to Step 11 on p. 1-16.

Caution: Never plug the display's power cord into a wall outlet; always plug it into the processor. The steps below are for installing a full-page display. If you have a partial-page monochrome display, turn to page 1-9. If you have a color display, turn to page 1-10.

The full-page controller board (9R80892) must have been installed in your processor so that the display connector is available for the display, as shown below. The location of the connector will depend upon where the board is installed. In Fig. 1-16, it is located in option slot 3. If your processor does not have this board installed, your service representative will install it for you.

- 9. Connect the full-page display cable to the processor.
 - . Place the display on top of the processor.
 - Look at the plug on the end of the display cable. Notice that the ring around the pins is wider on one side. Turn the plug so that the wider side is on the left. (See Fig. 1-16.)
 - Insert the plug (matching plug to connector) into the connector on the end of the full-page controller board.

INSTALLATION

- Tighten the screws on either end of the plug to secure the connection. Take care not to overtighten them.

- 10. Connect the full-page display's power cord to the processor.
 - Locate the display's power cord. (It is shorter and a lighter shade of gray than the processor's power cord.)
 - Locate the power socket in the lower right corner of the rear of the display unit (Fig. 1-17). Insert the female plug into this power socket, and the male (pronged) plug into the power socket on the rear of the processor (Fig. 1-17).
 - Press both plugs firmly into place.

Caution: Never plug the display's power cord into a wall outlet; always plug it into the processor.

Not all printers use the same connector interface. Some use a PARALLEL interface while others use a SERIAL interface. Xerox has provided both types of connectors on the back of the processor. You'll need to read your printer manual to determine whether your printer uses a parallel or serial interface. You'll also use your printer manual to set up your printer.

If you're using a Xerox printer, you may need to change the printer switch settings before operating the printer. This information is provided in Section 3: Printers, beginning on page 3-1.

11. Connect the printer to the processor.

- Plug the printer cable into the proper connector on the back of the processor, either "parallel" or "serial", matching plug to connector.
- Secure the connection by tightening the screws on both sides of the plug.

12. Connect the main power cord to the processor.

- Connect the female end of the main power cord to the main power socket on the back of the processor (Fig. 1-19).
- Insert the male (pronged) end into a grounded wall outlet.
- Press both plugs firmly into place.



Power-on Self Test

- 15. Locate the screen's brightness and contrast controls.
 - . If you have a partial page monochrome display, they will be located at the back of the display, as shown in Fig. 1-22.
 - If you have a full-page display, they will be located at the front of the unit, as shown in Fig. 1-24.
 - If you have a color display, they will either be located at the back of the display, as shown in Fig. 1-22, or on the sides of the display, as shown in Fig. 1-23.

16. Turn these controls clockwise as far as they will go. Then turn them back about half way.

IMPORTANT: If your screen is monochrome (black & white), it is recommended that you set the brightness to the lowest practical setting. Using high brightness can result in a residual image being etched on the screen.

You are now ready to turn the system on.

When you do, it will automatically complete a Self-Test which checks to be sure memory and basic components are working properly. This test will take from 15 to 90 seconds, depending on the amount of memory installed.

- 17. The On/Off switch is located above the power cable sockets on the back of the processor.
 - Turn the system on. Your screen will display information similar to that shown in Fig. 1-26.
 - Adjust the screen's brightness and contrast to a level that you find comfortable to view.

Note: The blinking **DISK READ ERROR** message appears when there is no disk in the drive.

- 18. If your system completed its Self-Test successfully:
 - Be sure you leave the system on for 12 hours in order to recharge the battery for the PC's internal clock.

Then

- . Go to Section 3: Printers, if you have a printer to install, or
- Turn the page and learn how to get started on your system, if you have no printer to install.

If your system did not complete its Self-Test, and the screen remained dark or an error message was displayed:

- . Adjust the brightness and contrast controls.
- Turn the system off. Check to be sure all plugs and connectors are secure. Check the wall outlet to be sure it has power. (Plug in a working lamp.) Plug the system back into the outlet and turn it on again.
- If you still have a dark screen or an error message, contact your service representative.

Installing a Memory Board in Your PC

	These instructions apply only to the Xerox Personal Computer. If you are installing memory in a Writer System, go to p. 2-21, How to Install Memory Chips in Your Writer System.
	This installation requires that both the top and bottom covers of the processor be removed. Remove the covers CAREFULLY to avoid cutting yourself on sharp edges or damaging delicate computer parts.
	If you have a hard disk system which has been in use, you'll need to put it into shipping mode before turning your processor over to remove the bottom cover. See Moving , p.6-1, for instructions on how to put your system into shipping mode.
	If you're adding memory to a system already set up:
	- BE SURE the computer's power switch is OFF.
`	- Unplug the power cord.
	. Check that the power switches on your printer and other devices are OFF.
	- Disconnect all plugs from the back of the processor.
	1. Loosen the two screws securing the top cover of the processor. (The screws do not have to come all the way out.)

- 2. Remove the processor's top cover.
 - Stand facing the back of the processor.
 - Place your hands on the top cover. Applying pressure with both hands, give one quick push away from you. The processor cover will move away from the back panel about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch.

- Move your hands to the sides of the top cover. Applying pressure with both hands, lift up on the cover with a quick pull. The sides will release.
- Lower the back of the cover a little and begin working the cover toward the front of the processor.
- If you look over the top to the front of the processor, you will be able to tell when the top cover has cleared the disk drives. When it does, begin lifting the cover up until it is completely off the processor.

Note: If you have memory chips to install on the memory board, turn to "How to Install Memory Chips in Your PC", beginning on page 2-10.



The memory board must be installed in the row of

- **3**. Locate the position for the memory board.
- 4. Remove the screw and the option slot plate and set them aside. See Fig. 2-3.
- 5. Locate the two wires connected to the back left corner of the processor. Gently move the wires back out of the way so you can insert the memory board as shown in Fig. 2-4 on the next page.



- 7. Insert the edge connectors into the sockets and press down firmly until the board "snaps" into place.
- 8. Secure the memory board in the slot with the screw removed earlier.
- 9. Replace the top cover of the processor as follows:

Lower the front of the cover into place. Press in on the sides of the cover as you lower them into place, making sure the cover edges fit inside the processor frame. See Fig. 2-5.




- With hands pressing firmly against the sides of the cover, give one quick pull toward the rear of the processor. Make sure the sides stay inside the processor frame. See Fig. 2-6.

- Tighten the two screws on the back to secure the top cover.

- **11**. Remove the processor's bottom cover.
 - Stand facing the back of the processor.

 - Lift up on the back of the bottom cover and then push it away from you off the front of the processor.

Options

- 12. Locate DIP Switch 0 on the processor board. See Fig. 2-8.
- 13. Determine your system's total memory using the following as a guideline.
 - Your processor board has 256K RAM (Random Access Memory).
 - Your memory board will have either 128K, 256K, or 384K. Check the label on the box if you're unsure.
 - If you added memory chips, add 128K to the total memory for each kit (group of 18 chips) added.

14. Position the switches on Dip Switch 0.

- Look in the total memory column above and find the total memory for your system.
- To the right of the total memory column are the switch positions for switches 1 through 4. **Do not** change the positions of switches 5, 6, 7, and 8.
- Look at DIP Switch 0 on the processor board to determine which way is ON. (There may be a very small ON somewhere on the switch. ON may also be represented by the number 1 or an up arrow, and OFF, by the digit 0.)
- Set switches 1 through 4. To change a switch setting, use the tip of a ball point pen or small screwdriver to push the switch lever into the other position.



16. Return to Section 1: Installation, page 1-7 to finish installing your system.

If you added a memory board to a system that was already set up:

- Connect all plugs to the back of the processor.
- Connect the power cord.
- Turn the system on.

The screen will display a message indicating the amount of total memory in the system.

If the new memory is properly installed, the amount of memory displayed on the screen will be the total amount of memory now installed in your system.

If the screen indicates a different amount of memory, remove the bottom cover and double check the settings of DIP Switch 0.

- 2. Remove the processor's top cover.
 - Stand facing the back of the processor. Place your hands on the top cover. Applying pressure with both hands, give one quick push away from you. The top cover will move away from the back panel about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch.

- Move your hands to the sides of the top cover. Applying pressure with both hands, lift up on the cover with a quick pull. The sides will release.
- Lower the back of the cover a little and begin working the cover toward the front of the processor.
- If you look over the top to the front of the processor, you will be able to tell when the top cover has cleared the disk drives. When it does, begin lifting the cover up until it is completely off the processor.

3. The memory board is installed in the row of double sockets farthest from the disk drives. If the memory board is already installed, it will need to be removed.

- Locate and remove the screw securing the memory board. Set it aside.
- Grasp the board by the top and bottom edges and lift it straight up. Be careful not to cut yourself on the board's pins and components. All existing chips will be in rows across the upper left corner of the board as shown in Fig. 2-4.
- If your board has 128K of memory, the existing chips will fill rows A and B; you will install the new chips in rows C and D.
- If your board has 256K of memory, the existing chips will fill rows A, B, C, and D; you will install the new chips in rows E and F.

- 7. Locate the two wires connected to the back left corner of the processor. Gently move the wires back out of the way so you can insert the memory board as shown in Fig. 2-7 above.
- 8. Align the edge connectors over the sockets. See Fig. 2-7.
- 9. Insert the edge connectors into the sockets and press down **firmly** until the board "snaps" into place.
- 10. Secure the memory board in the slot with the screw removed earlier.

- Lower the front of the cover into place. Press in on the sides of the cover as you lower them into place, making sure the cover edges fit inside the processor frame. See Fig. 2-8.

- With hands pressing firmly against the sides of the cover, give one quick pull toward the rear of the processor. Make sure the sides (stay inside the processor frame. See Fig. 2-9.
- Tighten the two screws on the back to secure the top cover.

12. Carefully turn the processor over and loosen the two screws securing the bottom cover. See Fig. 2-10.

13. Remove the processor's bottom cover.

- Stand facing the back of the processor.
- Place your hands on the bottom cover. Applying pressure with both hands, give one quick push away from you. The processor cover will move away from the back panel.

14. Locate DIP Switch 0 on the processor board. See Fig. 2-11.

- 15. Determine your system's total memory using the following as a guideline.
 - Your processor board has 256K RAM (Random Access Memory).
 - Your memory board has 128K if rows A and B are filled with chips; 256K if rows A, B, C, and D are filled with chips, and 384K if rows A, B, C, D, E, and F are filled with chips.

16. Position the switches on DIP Switch 0.

- Look in the total memory column above and find the total memory for your system.
- To the right of the total memory column are the switch positions for switches 1 through 4. **Do not** change the positions of switches 5, 6, 7, and 8.
- Look at DIP Switch 0 on the processor board and determine which way is ON. (There may be a very small ON somewhere on the switch. ON may also be represented by the number 1 or an up arrow, and OFF, by the digit 0.)
- Set switches 1 through 4. To change a switch setting, use the tip of a ball point pen or small screwdriver to push the switch lever into the other position.



18. Return to Section 1: Installation, page 1-7 to finish installing your system.

If you added memory chips to a system that was already set up:

- Connect all plugs to the back of the processor.
- Connect the power cord.
- Turn the system on.

If the screen indicates a different amount of memory, remove the bottom cover and double check the settings of DIP Switch 0.

How to Install Memory Chips in Your Writer System

These instructions apply only to the Writer System. If you are installing additional memory in a Xerox Personal Computer, go to p.2-1, Installing a Memory Board in Your PC , or p.2- 10, How to Install Memory Chips in Your PC .
This installation requires that both the top and bottom covers of the processor be removed. Remove the covers CAREFULLY to avoid cutting yourself on sharp edges or damaging delicate computer parts.

If you're adding memory to a system already set up:
. BE SURE the computer's power switch is OFF.

. Disconnect all plugs from the back of the processor.

1. Loosen the two screws securing the bottom cover of the processor. (The screws do not have to come all the way out.)

 - . Stand facing the back of the processor.

- 3. Locate the sockets for the new memory chips. (You will use the last two rows of memory chip sockets on the processor board. See Fig. 2-2.)

Note: You may find it easier to remove the jumpers with a pair of tweezers or needle-nosed pliers.

10. Look at Fig. 2-7 to locate the label holder on the wire mounting frame. Remove the clear plastic strip from the label holder.

Note: The plastic strip is flexible and can be removed easily if you insert your thumb nail beneath one edge of the strip and press until it bends in the middle.

11. Locate the pre-printed labels that came with the NEU kit.

12. If you are installing only one NEU:

- Insert the label NEU 1 -- Master into the label holder and replace the plastic strip. Insert one edge of the plastic strip first, then bend the strip so that you can insert the other edge more easily.
- Go to Step 18.

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Using "diagnostics"

The term "diagnostics" refers to programs which verify that the components of your system are working properly.

In the Software Disk box that came with your system, you'll find a disk labeled DIAGNOSTIC DISK. It will test the following components:

- Main Board in the Processor
- Memory (including optional board)
- Keyboard
- Display
- Parallel Interface Port
- Serial Interface Port
- Disk Drives

You should use the Diagnostic Disk whenever you suspect a faulty component. The information you collect by running this program can reduce repair time.

Before you run diagnostics, you will need to know the following information about your computer:

- how much memory your computer has
- whether you have one or two floppy disk drives
- whether you have a hard disk
- whether your printer is connected to the computer's parallel port or to its serial port
- whether you have a monochrome (black and white) or color display.

Inserting Your Diagnostics Disk

- 1. Find the disk labeled DIAGNOSTIC DISK in the software disk box.
- 2. Also obtain two <u>blank</u> (or erasable) floppy disks.
- 3. Remove the Diagnostic Disk from its jacket and check to see that it is protected by a write-protect tape, as shown in Fig. 4-1.



Figure 4-1. Be sure the write/protect tape is on.

Compare the floppy disk drive(s) on your processor with the illustrations below. (If your system has a hard disk, it will have only one floppy drive.)



Figure 4-2. Illustration of floppy disk drives.

4. Open your floppy disk drive(s) by turning the disk drive lever up and to the right. 5. Holding the disk with its label up, gently insert it in the <u>bottom</u> disk drive. When you hear a click, the disk is all the way in.





6. Close your floppy disk drive (s) by pulling the disk drive lever down and to the left.



Figure 4-4. Closing the disk drives.

Note: Never remove a disk when its drive indicator light is on. Doing so may destroy data on the disk.

Formatting a Disk

If you have a new system, you will need to format one or two disks before you run your diagnostic program. Obtain two new (or used erasable) disks and go to Step 1 below.

If you already have two formatted disks, go to page 4-7, Running Diagnostics.

- 1. If your system is not turned on:
 - Turn on your printer first.
 - Turn on your processor.
- 2. If your Diagnostic Disk is in drive A, the following will display on the screen.

Automatic Mode checks your computer's parts one at a time, according to a prearranged checklist. The test takes 15 to 20 minutes. At the end of the test, a summary of test results will be displayed.

Nonautomatic Mode allows you to choose which component you wish to test. In addition, you may select how many times you want a specific test to run. You would choose nonautomatic mode if you were concerned about the functioning of a particular component.

In either mode, any errors that are detected will be displayed on the screen.

In the following pages, you will learn how to select various options in Nonautomatic Mode. If you wish to use Automatic Mode, simply press 1 and follow the instructions on the screen.

3. If you wish to use **Automatic Mode**, type the number 1 and press the RETURN key. Then go to step 5.

If you wish to use **Nonautomatic Mode**, type the number **0** and press the RETURN key.

In the Nonautomatic Mode, the following message will be displayed:

Running a Sample Test

Although the procedures for these tests vary slightly, the following example will serve as a general guideline on how to run a test. To select the Main Board test: **1**. Type the number 1 and press RETURN. The following message will appear: PAUSE ON ERROR? ('0' = NO, '1' = YES) 2. Type the number 0 and press RETURN. Whether you choose to pause when an error is detected or continue the test uninterrupted. any errors that are found will be displayed on the TEST RESULTS summary screen. If you were running a test other than the Main Board test, your screen could display additional messages or instructions at this point. These messages would be self-explanatory. When the test is near completion, you will hear an ascending tone and a beep, then see the following message flash briefly on the screen: **TEST 100 - MAIN BOARD 0 ERRORS IN MAIN BOARD TESTS (LOOP #1)**

Completing the Diagnostic Test

If an error occurs, run the test a second time. If an error occurs again, write it down and contact your service representative.

- **3**. Press the RETURN key to return to the diagnostics screen. If you wish to run additional tests, press the appropriate test number and repeat the steps outlined in this example.
- 4. Be sure the Diagnostic Disk is removed. If you have a dual floppy system, insert the MS-DOS Boot Disk. Press the RESET button on the front of the processor.

Warning: The formatted disks used in this Diagnostic exercise need to be reformatted before they can be used again as data disks. Failure to do so will result in data loss.

The Processor

The processor unit is the electronic core of your system. It contains your disk drives, the computer's memory, and the main circuit board. This board contains a powerful Central Processing Unit (CPU), an Intel 8086 8MHz 16 bit microprocessor, which reads and executes all programming instructions.

Inside your processor unit are seven expansion slots, which you may use to add a memory board or other options. At the back of the unit, you will see the connectors that enable you to connect a keyboard, display unit, printers, communications equipment or other computers. (See Fig. 5-1.)



Figure 5-1. Back of the processor

Disk Drives Designed to Suit Your Needs

One versatile feature of the Xerox PC is that you can use either dual floppy disk drives or a combination of hard and floppy disk drives. Your choice will depend upon your particular storage needs.

The dual floppy system consists of two doublesided floppy disk drives capable of reading and writing standard single- or double-density $5\frac{1}{4}$ inch disks.



Figure 5-2. Dual Floppy Disk System

These disks look like flexible phonograph records, and in fact operate much like records. When information is stored or retrieved, the disks are rotated at very high speeds, and a read/write head can be positioned over any part of the rotating disk. Because the disks are double-density, you can store up to twice the information as you could on a singledensity disk.

Since additional floppy disks can be purchased as needed, this system is ideally suited to the customer who wants to store many small blocks of data (i.e., letters, reports, etc.). The hard disk system consists of one double-sided floppy disk drive which has a nonremovable disk. The floppy disk drive is included so that you can read software programs purchased on floppy disks, and so that you can make backup copies of information stored on your hard disk to protect you against accidental data loss.



Figure 5-3. Hard Disk System

The hard disk system holds much more information than the dual floppy system, and allows you faster access to data. In addition, it spares you the inconvenience of changing disks.

The Display Unit

The Xerox PC may be purchased with either a 12inch color or a 12-inch monochrome display unit. Both have high-resolution flicker-free screens which have been specially treated to reduce glare, and both are capable of displaying text and graphics.

Whether you choose a color or monochrome display, you will have one of two different styles. One style features a continuous friction joint on the base that allows you to swivel your screen 360° , as shown in Fig. 5-4. The other style can be swiveled 45° to the left or right, as shown in Fig. 5-5.

All display units may be tilted as much as 20° up or 10° down. Simply adjust the screen to the angle that seems most comfortable to you.

Brightness and Contrast Controls

Locate the screen's brightness and contrast controls.

- . If you have a partial page monochrome display, they will be located at the back of the display, as shown in Fig. 5-7.
- . If you have a full-page display, they will be located at the front of the unit, as shown in Fig. 5-8A.
- . If you have a color display, they will either be located at the back of the display, as shown in Fig. 5-7, or on the sides of the display, as shown in Fig. 5-8.

IMPORTANT: If your screen is monochrome (black & white), it is recommended that you set the brightness to the lowest practical setting. Using high brightness can result in a residual image being etched on the screen.

<u>Notes</u> :		
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The Keyboard

The keyboard is your means of communicating with the processor. Through it, you select and run software programs and enter data.

Look at Fig. 5-9 and Fig. 5-10 to determine whether you have a PC keyboard or a Word Processing keyboard. If you have a PC keyboard, go to p.5-8. If you have a Word Processing keyboard, go to p. 5-12.

The PC Keyboard

To make it more convenient to use, your PC keyboard is divided into three sections:

- a typewriter section, which holds the alphanumeric keys found on a standard typewriter, plus a few special keys
- a numeric keypad, which is used to enter numeric data and control movement of the cursor
- a block of ten function keys, which can be programmed to carry specific instructions to the computer

The following pages describe the specific functions of certain keys as they are used on your computer.

The Typewriter Section



The Return key, also called the Enter key, must be pressed whenever you want to enter a command. In addition, it functions like the carriage return on a standard typewriter.



The Backspace key erases the last character typed as it moves the cursor one position to the left.

Print Screen, when pressed along with the



Shift key, sends a copy of whatever is displayed on the screen to the printer. It types an asterisk when unshifted.



The two Shift keys function like the Shift keys on a standard typewriter.



The Caps Lock key, which affects only the characters A through Z, locks these letters in the uppercase position. To get lowercase letters while the Caps Lock key is on, press the Shift key.


The Escape key usually cancels an entry. Its function depends upon the software you're using.



The Alternate key is also used with other keys to perform many different functions. When used with keys on the numeric keypad, it displays special characters on the screen.



The Tab key moves the cursor one tab position to the right each time it is pressed. When the cursor comes to the end of a line, it will move to the first tab position on the next line when Tab is pressed. When pressed with Shift, it moves the cursor one tab position to the left.



The Control key is used to modify the function of other keys. Its function depends upon the software you're using.

The Space Bar moves the cursor one character position to the right each time it is pressed. Any character the cursor moves over is erased.



Numeric Keypad





When the Number Lock key is pressed once, its light will go on and the numeric keypad will be activated. When pressed again, keys 0 through 9 return to cursor control.

The Scroll Lock key is not used by MS-DOS. In most application programs, when Scroll Lock is activated it will stop the screen from scrolling up or down. See your application software manual for more information. The Break key is pressed with the Control key to exit or terminate a command or program.



The Delete key is used to edit previously entered commands. It erases the character at the current cursor position and moves text following the deleted character one position to the left.



The Insert key allows you to add characters in the middle of a line and moves the text that follows the insertion to the right. To turn Insert off, press the key a second time.



The Home Key moves the cursor to the first character on the first line of the screen. It is not used by MS-DOS.



The Up Arrow moves the cursor up one line on the screen.



Each time the Left Arrow key is pressed, it moves the cursor one position to the left.



The Right Arrow key moves the cursor one position to the right.



The Down Arrow moves the cursor down one line on the screen



The function of the End key depends upon the application software package that you are using.



The Page Up key, which is not used by MS-DOS, scrolls the display upward.



The Page Down key scrolls the display downward. Page Down is not used by MS-DOS.

Caution: Never use a lowercase 1 or an uppercase I for the digit one. Similarly, never use the letter O for the digit zero, as the computer will not recognize these characters as numbers.

The Function Keys

Function Keys F1 through F10 are controlled by the software being used. Consult your MS-DOS manual for information about the many ways that they can be used.



The Word Processing Keyboard

Your Word Processing keyboard is conveniently arranged in four distinct sections:

- a typewriter section, which holds the alphanumeric keys found on a standard typewriter, plus a few special keys
- a block of four arrow keys which control the movements of the cursor. The EXEC key, used to enter commands, is also found in this block.
- a numeric keypad, which is "...ed to enter numeric data.
- a row of special feature keys which are used to implement many of the important functions available on your keyboard.

Designed with versatility in mind, your keyboard can also be used as a PC keyboard. The functions printed on the front of certain keys are PC functions which are automatically activated whenever a PC program is loaded in your computer. For detailed information on these functions, refer to **The PC Keyboard**, p. 5-8.

The following pages describe in detail the word processing functions of certain keys.

The Typewriter Section





The Return key functions like the carriage return on a standard typewriter.

The Backspace key erases the last character typed as it moves the cursor one position to the left.



The two Shift keys function like the Shift keys on a standard typewriter.



The Code key is used with other keys to perform many different functions. When pressed in conjunction with any key with a green legend on the keycap, it activates the function described by that legend. When pressed with a key in the top row of the typewriter section of the keyboard, it activates the function described immediately above that key.



The Lock key, which affects only the characters A through Z, locks these letters in the uppercase position. To get lowercase letters while the Lock key is on, press the Shift key.



The Upper Tab key indents the first line of a paragraph.



The Lower Tab key indents the entire paragraph.

The Space Bar is used like the spacebar on a standard typewriter.



Cursor Control Keys



The Up Arrow moves the cursor up one line on the screen.



Each time the Left Arrow key is pressed, it moves the cursor one position to the left.



The Right Arrow key moves the cursor one position to the right.



The Down Arrow moves the cursor down one line on the screen.



The Exec key must be pressed to activate a command after it has been selected.

Special Feature Keys



When the Trnsf key is pressed, a menu is displayed on the screen which allows you to retrieve or store a file, restore format lines to their original settings prior to editing, or restore a page to its original form prior to editing.



The Mrg key is used in Records Processing.



The Rplc key calls up a menu which allows the user a number of options when doing a global search and replace.



The Find key is used to locate a string of text within a document. It too calls up a menu which allows the user a variety of options.



Tab St is used to set or change tabs within a document. Fmt brings up a menu which allows the user to set the format for a document.



When the Centr key is pressed, all text will be centered between left and right margins. When this key is pressed together with the Code key, Cn Tab is activated, and text is centered over a tab setting.



Dc Tab is used to align text at a decimal point. Rt. Tab is used to type text with an even right margin. The cursor moves to the left as text is entered.



Rg Pg inserts a required page break. Tmp Pg inserts a temporary, or non-required, page break.



The Go To key brings up a menu which is used to move to different locations within a document.



Cmmd and Fnct both bring up menus which list a wide variety of special functions.



The Copy key allows you to copy text from one document to another, or from one location within a document to another.



The Move key allows you to move text from one document to another, or to a different location within the same document.



When the Ins key is pressed once, text may be inserted at the cursor position. When pressed again, Typeover Mode is activated and any text that is entered will replace existing text.



The Mark key is used to highlight more than one character, word, line, or paragraph at a time for editing. Col Mk is used to highlight a single column for editing.



When the Del key is pressed, all highlighted text will be deleted.



The Cancl key is used to stop an operation in progress or to exit from a menu.



The Help key is used to display special documents to help the user with specific questions about the Writer System.



The Phrase key is used to recall previously stored phrases.



The Windw key is used to open up more than one document at a time.

Adjusting Your PC Keyboard

Your keyboard can be left at a five-degree tilt or, if you prefer, it can be adjusted to stand at a tendegree tilt. To raise your PC keyboard:

- Turn the keyboard over.
- Locate the two adjustable feet on either side of the keyboard. (See Fig. 5-9.)
- Press the feet in as you flip them up.

Adjusting Your Word Processing Keyboard

Your keyboard can be adjusted to stand at two different tilts. To raise your keyboard:

- Turn the keyboard over.
- Locate the two adjustable feet on either side of the keyboard. (See Fig. 5-10.)
- Insert a finger in the indented space beneath each foot and flip the foot up. The feet may be set at two different positions.

The Mouse

One of the options offered with your Xerox PC is an optical mouse. When moved across the surface of the gray card that came with it, it controls the movements of the cursor on the screen and makes your job faster and easier.

Once you have connected your mouse to the keyboard:

1. Choose a convenient location for your gray card. If you are left-handed, you may want to place it to the left of your keyboard.

- 2. Remove the transfer tape on the back of the card.
- 3. Stick the card to your desk.
- 4. Practice moving the mouse across the card as you press the two buttons on the mouse. (See Fig. 5-12.) You will find that the left button highlights the cursor's position and the right button enters commands, much like the RETURN key on your keyboard.

Moving Your Xerox Personal Computer

Whether you are moving your system to another floor or to another city, care must be taken to be sure that the system is not damaged.

If you have a hard disk, you must move the disk head before moving the system. Go to Step 1.

If you have a dual floppy system, go to Step 7.

1. Insert your MS-DOS disk with Screenmate and turn your system on.

The User's Mode menu will be displayed.

- 10. Unplug the main power cable from its power source.
- 11. Disconnect all plugs from the backs of the units.
- 12. Wrap the cables to protect the plugs.
- 13. Tape the cables to the units with masking or filament tape.
- 14. If you are moving your system a short distance (i.e., from one room to another), move each unit separately.

- 15. If you are moving your system a longer distance and have saved the original cartons and packing material:
 - Place each unit in its protective plastic wrapping.
 - Replace the end pieces on each unit.
 - Place each unit in the appropriate box.
 - Replace the protective cover pieces.

If you have not saved the original packing material, place each unit in a separate box and cushion well.

Application Software Programs designed for a specific use (i.e., Word Processing) and distributed on floppy disks.

Central Processing Unit (CPU) An 8086 chip located on your processor board. The CPU is the microprocessor which controls all computer operations.

Co-Processor An 8087 chip which can be added to your system to expand the arithmetic functions of your CPU.

Command An instruction to the computer which is entered from the keyboard.

Cursor A blinking underline or rectangle which indicates where the next entry from the keyboard will appear on the screen.

Data Information used by the computer.

Diagnostics A series of tests used to determine whether the different parts of the computer are functioning correctly.

Directory A list of the files found on a floppy disk or hard disk.

Floppy Disk A flexible magnetic storage medium similar in looks and operation to a phonograph record.

Format The process whereby a disk is prepared for use by the computer.

Function Keys Special keys which can be programmed to carry specific instructions to the computer.

Hard Disk A permanent storage device which allows for rapid retrieval of information and is capable of holding large quantities of data.

Memory An area within the computer itself where instructions and data are held. The two principal kinds of memory are Read Only Memory (ROM) (and Random Access Memory (RAM).

Menu A list of options appearing on the screen from which the user may choose what operation he wants the computer to perform.

Mouse A manually operated device which controls the movements of the cursor on the screen.

MS-DOS The operating system used by the Xerox PC, MS-DOS controls the system's most basic operations (i.e., file management, loading and execution of user programs, etc.)

Operating System The program that acts as an interface between the computer and the computer user. See **MS-DOS.**

Parallel Port The socket, or port, on the back of the processor used to connect a parallel printer.

Processor The main unit of your system, the processor contains the disk drives, the memory, and the processor board.

Processor Board The main circuit board, which is located beneath the bottom cover of the Xerox PC.

Program A set of instructions that tells the computer how to receive, store, process and deliver data. Some programs are designed to accomplish very specific goals, such as balancing a checkbook.

Random Access Memory (RAM) Temporary memory located within the computer itself. You may write into RAM as well as read from it, but data will only remain in RAM as long as the computer is turned on.

Read Only Memory (ROM) Permanent memory stored in the computer at the time of manufacture. You can read from but cannot write onto ROM. **Reset Button** The button located on the front of your processor which can be used to restart the system without turning the power switch off and on again.

Serial Port The socket, or port, on the back of the processor which is used to connect a serial printer or other device using a serial communications method.

Write-Protect A method of ensuring that data on a disk is not accidentally erased. To write-protect a disk, place a write-protect tab over the notch on the side of the disk. Notes:
